



Background / Discussion

Planning Division received an Official Plan and Zoning By-law amendment application for the lands located at 780 Sydney Street on June 18th, 2019.

The City of Cornwall's Official Plan was approved by the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing on April 11th, 2018. Recognizing that Official Plan amendments within the two year time frame may be appropriate, which allows Councils to permit Official Plan amendment applications so long as they have passed a Resolution to that effect. The request to make an application was discussed by City Council at the June 10th, 2019 Council meeting and Resolution No. 2019-17 was passed at the subsequent Council meeting of June 24th, 2019.

This item was initially presented at the July 29th, 2019 PAC meeting. The decision was deferred to a later meeting date in order to further evaluate the proposal and attempt to address Public concerns received at that said meeting.

Further to the PAC meeting held on July 29th, 2019, Planning staff met with abutting land owners and the applicants on two separate occasions, on September 9th, 2019 and subsequently on September 25th, 2019. The purpose of the meetings was to review the proposal, provide clarity regarding some of the noted concerns and make a valid attempt to reach a mutual consensus regarding site design.

The item was presented to the Planning Advisory & Hearing Committee for a second time at the meeting held on October 22nd, 2019. The meeting was well attended by members of the Public. Planning staff provided PAC members with a modified proposal and an update since the initial July 29th, 2019 PAC meeting.

Planning staff reiterated that the proposed low intensity commercial expansion is consistent with the PPS and a strong majority of applicable Official Plan policies. Stringent design criteria will be implemented via the Site Plan approval process such that a review of buffering, servicing, lighting, landscaping and traffic issues will be satisfactorily addressed to mitigate potential landuse conflicts.



Following a brief discussion, the following motion to approve the modified proposal was made:

That PAC recommends to City Council to amend the Official Plan designation at 780 Sydney Street from 'Urban Residential' (U.RES) to 'Business District ' (B.D.), and amend the Zoning By-law from Institutional 10 (INS 10) to Commercial 12 (COM12) based on the September 2019 modified proposal; and that findings / recommendations of the various associated studies / reports included, be implemented to the satisfaction of the municipality and as part of the Site Plan Control approval process.

B. BACKGROUND

Planning Division received an Official Plan and Zoning By-law amendment application for the lands located at 780 Sydney Street on June 18th, 2019 . The proposal is to change the current Official Plan Designation from Urban Residential (U RES) to Business District (B.D.) and Zoning from Institutional 10 (INS 10) to Commercial 12 (COM 12) on the southerly portion of the subject lands as per the attached preliminary site plan, **(Attachment II).**

City of Cornwall's Official Plan was adopted by the City on October 23rd, 2017 and approved by the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing on April 11th, 2018.

Section 22 (2.1) of the Planning Act states that "no person or public body shall request an amendment to a new Official Plan before the second anniversary of the first day any part of the plan comes into effect". This provision within the Planning Act was enacted through the Smart Growth for Our Communities Act (2015), and its intention is to provide municipalities with more control and stability over their planning documents.

Recognizing that Official Plan amendments within the two year time frame may be appropriate, the Province of Ontario Smart Growth for our Communities Act also included Section 22 (2.2) of the Planning Act, which allows Councils to permit Official Plan amendment applications so long as they have passed a Resolution to that effect. Under this provision, Councils may choose to permit Official Plan amendments on a case-by-case basis, for specific types or classes of Official Plan amendments, or for all Official Plan amendments.

The request to make an application was discussed by City Council at the June 10th, 2019 Council meeting and Resolution No. 2019-17 was passed at the subsequent Council meeting of June 24th, 2019, (Attachment III).

The property located at 780 Sydney Street was formerly owned by the Upper Canada District and French Public School Board from 1957 to 2011 and was acquired in 2011 by the Wesleyan Church of Canada. The overall property has a long standing Urban Residential (U.RES) Designation and Institutional 10 (INS 10) zoning.

An associated zoning change is being considered simultaneously, in order to change the Institutional 10 (INS 10) zoning to Commercial 12 (COM 12).

The overall institutional parcel is approximately 3.15 acres and the subject area is 0.98 acres. If the proponent is successful with the Official Plan and By-law amendment, then the intent is to subsequently proceed with a consent application in order to create the 0.98 acre site and amalgamate the additional parking lot with the existing auto dealership located on Pitt Street. This parcel will be merged with the 1.09 acre parcel to the west totalling approximately 2.07 acres.

C. SITE CHARACTERISTICS

Location:

Municipally known as 780 Sydney Street

Part of Lot 12, Concession 3, situated along the west side of Sydney Street.

Immediately east of the Miller Hughes Ford Car Dealership located at 711 Pitt Street.

Proposed Development Area on Subject Site:

Frontage along Sydney Street +/- 27.7 metres (+/- 90 ft).

Irregular Depth of +/- 45.7 metres (+/- 149 ft).

Irregular Lot Area +/- 3,965 m² (square metres) (+/- 0.98 acres/ .39 hectares).

Existing Land Use:

Institutional - Place of Worship

Surrounding Land Use:

North: Commercial - Farm Boy South: Low Density Single Family Residential East : Low Density Single Family Residential West: Commercial

Official Plan:

D. COMMENTS FROM OTHER DEPARTMENTS / AGENCIES

Municipal Works:

No objection.

Building Division:

No objection, obtain building permits for fencing and infrastructure for site drainage.

Engineering Division:

We do no have any concerns related to the proposed OP and Zoning change. Engineering design items will be addressed at the Site Plan Approval stage.

Transit Division:

No objection.

Cornwall Community Police Services:

No objection.

Municipal Assessor:

No objection.

Economic Development:

Miller Hughes has been a positive economic presence in the Downtown core for decades, constantly reinvesting in their business. The proposed expansion will allow the dealership to remain competitive and will facilitate ongoing future investment. It is a good example of the benefits of supporting in fill development.

Traffic Engineer:

Sydney Street is a designated arterial roadway, and provides plenty of capacity. The no truck restriction along Sydney Street was due to vibration, particularly between Second and Fourth. Sydney is scheduled for full reconstruction up to Ninth Street by 2021. This year from Second to Fourth. Once the road and pavement structure is fully reconstructed, we will likely seek to lift the no truck restriction, as it makes no sense for an arterial roadway, (subject to Council approval). In addition the proposed use would not likely be a high traffic generator. Also, just north of this location, between Eighth and Ninth, the uses are all commercial. As always, this will be subject to Site Plan Control.

E. EVALUATION

The Planning Division has reviewed the subject application and is conditionally supportive based on the following:

Development Site:

The property fronts onto a one-way arterial street (Sydney Street) at the east limit and along a one-way connector (Eighth Street East). Located to the west is Miller Hughes Ford Ltd., an automotive dealership that has been located at 711 Pitt Street for over 60 years and has been subject to Site Plan approvals and received Brownfield funding in the past.

Located to the immediate north of the subject area is the balance of lands including the main building, Cornwall Wesleyan Church and its associated parking lot that extends onto the land that is the subject of this application.

To the south of the subject site is one (1) single detached dwelling fronting onto Sydney Street and four (4) single detached homes fronting onto Seventh Street East. There are single detached dwellings across from Sydney Street.

Applicable Provincial Policy Statements (PPS's)

i.) Policy 1.1.1. - Healthy, liveable and safe communities are sustained by:

"a.) promoting efficient development and land use patterns which sustain the financial well-being of the Province and Municipalities over the long-term

g.) ensuring that necessary infrastructure....are or will be available to meet current and projected needs..."

e.) promoting cost-effective development patterns and standards to minimize land consumption and servicing costs;

The establishment of this land use in close proximity to a long-standing commercial area is compatible with these policies if the configuration of low intensive designated parking area ancillary to the Miller Hughes development is modified to address valid concerns received from abutting land owners in respect to buffering, lighting and heavy transport access.

Policy 1.1.2 - Within settlement areas, sufficient land shall be made available through intensification and redevelopment.

The area in question is located within the settlement area, the proposed redevelopment and intensification of the lands is promoted. The low intensive commercial use will solely be used for parking of inventory (vehicles).

Policy 1.1.3.2(a)(b) - Land use patterns within settlement areas shall be based on:

(a) efficiently use land and resources;

(b) are appropriate for, and efficiently use, the infrastructure and public service facilities which are planned or available, and avoid the need for their unjustified and/or uneconomical expansion;

The property backs directly onto the Commercial Business District, there is an opportunity for a land assembly which will allow for direct access to the applicant's commercial site. There is available existing infrastructure along Sydney Street or via the Miller Hughes which will not necessitate unjustified or uneconomical expansion of infrastructure.

Land Use Compatibility - 1.2.6.1 Major facilities and sensitive land uses should be planned to ensure they are appropriately designed, buffered and/or separated from each other to prevent or mitigate adverse effects from odour, noise and other contaminants, minimize risk to public health and safety, and to ensure the long-term viability of major facilities.

Even though there is no major facility being proposed, the development site abuts sensitive land uses. When considering the nature of the proposed use of the lands, during the site plan process the City will ensure that a stringent amount of mitigation measures will be introduced to minimize any potential land use conflicts. 1.3.1 - Planning authorities shall promote economic development and competitiveness by:

b) providing opportunities for a diversified economic base, including maintaining a range and choice of suitable sites for employment uses which support a wide range of economic activities and ancillary uses, and take into account the needs of existing and future businesses;

d) ensuring the necessary infrastructure is provided to support current and projected needs.

If the applicant is successful in obtaining the required development approvals it will enable the existing automotive dealership to meet its present and future needs for the temporary storage of vehicles to support its continued success as an automotive franchise. This dealership has been in existence for over 60 years at 711 Pitt Street, and has limited storage area both on the dealership site and lot on the west side of Pitt Street. City Council promoted the opportunity for economic development at 711 Pitt Street by providing the automotive dealership with a grant under its Heart of the City (HOTC) Community Improvement Program (CIP) and Brownfield funding in 2011 in order to achieve Ford Canada Corporate imaging program.

Applicable Official Plan Policies:

The parcel is presently designated 'Urban Residential' similar to lands to the south and east side of Sydney Street.

Planning Principles

2.5.1 The following principles are considered to be fundamental planning concepts and form the basis for more detailed goals and policies:

2.5.1.17 A compatible Land Use pattern should be promoted

One of the major considerations for reviewing development applications or locating land uses should be compatible with adjacent land uses. In some cases the conflicts between land uses can be reduced through such measures as buffering, landscaping, screening and sensitive siting and massing of buildings. Opportunities for redevelopment of existing non compatible sites or uses to more compatible uses should be sought out and encouraged.

No major development is being planned, the proposed low intensive commercial parking use can be well incorporated into the existing property. Regulatory measures and stringent buffering and design principles will be examined during the site plan approval process in order to mitigate land use conflicts between the lands to the south.

2.6.3 Goals General

(2) Encourage the infilling and consolidation of existing urban development areas and promote the efficient utilization of existing municipal services.

(4) Encourage the revitalization and appropriate redevelopment of core established Business Districts.

(13) Encourage redevelopment, upgrading and efficient use of underutilized sites and neglected land. Environmental Site Assessments (ESA's) shall be conducted if contamination of such neglected lands is suspected and the filing of a Record of Site Condition (RSC) where required by the City or Ministry of the Environment and Climate Change (MOECC).

The proposal is in keeping with the aforementioned policies. The location of the subject site is located on the fringe area of the business core and would be considered as an extension to an established business onto vacant unfertilized lands. An ESA Phase 1 of the subject site has been submitted and the Q.P.'s recommendation is to proceed to a Phase 2 assessment.

3.2 Goals and Principles

A more consolidated and compact urban development pattern is more cost efficient for the City and its taxpayers and would:

(a) Ensure that the future development blends in with existing neighbourhoods;

(e) Promote the strengthening of strong established Business Districts by maintaining future development within easy reach of core areas;

The applications are in keeping with these policies, as highlighted by the consultant;

"One of the benefits of a compact urban form is that it would "promote strong established Business Districts by maintaining future development within easy reach of core areas." The current success of the automotive dealership at 711 Pitt Street is partly due to its proximity to the Downtown Core. According to the automobile franchise owner at 711 Pitt Street, many of the patrons of the dealership find it convenient to drop off their car and walk to work at their place of employment in the Downtown core."

4.4.3 General Policies

In order to achieve the goals for commercial land use, it will be the intention of the City to:

4.4.3(4) Ensure that new commercial development and redevelopment are in accordance with acceptable site plan approval procedures and principles.

4.4.3(5) Ensure that adjacent land uses and districts are protected from commercial development through appropriate measures such as buffering and screening, control over open storage, signs and outdoor display, diversion of illumination, maintenance of properties, massing and placement of buildings.

4.4.3(6) Require commercial developments to provide appropriate landscaping adjacent to streets and within the interior of the site.

As indicated throughout the report, the aforementioned policies support commercial activities when abutting a different land use if design principles are introduced to mitigate potential conflicts.

4.5.2 Business District Policies

In order to achieve the goals for the Business Districts, it will be the intention of the City to:

4.5.2(4) Discourage the use of land and buildings in the Business Districts for the purposes of industry, warehousing, large scale automobile sales and service, support facilities, (outdoor) storage yards and similar uses which may diminish the cohesiveness, integrity, or amenity of the Business District as an area with a high level of retail, office, institutional, Government, residential and recreational activity. The Municipality shall not pass by-laws to permit the development of such uses in the Business District.

4.5.2(12) Support initiatives undertaken by local landowners, merchants and other tenants, in developing ways to improve streetscapes, pedestrian facilities, building facades and properties in Business District areas and seek support of Senior Governments in upgrading of such areas. Such initiatives are often undertaken through activities of the Cornwall Heart of the City/Centretown Cornwall group, the Business Improvement Areas, and through the Community Improvement Plans.

The City's Official Plan Discourages the development use of land and buildings in the Business Districts for the purposes of industry, warehousing, large scale automobile sales and service, support facilities, (outdoor) storage yards and similar uses which may diminish the cohesiveness, integrity, or amenity of the Business District. Secondly, it also indicates that Municipality shall not pass By-laws to permit the development of such uses.

The Official Plan Policy discourages and does not outright prohibit the development and use of land for the above mentioned uses, the proposal is a low intensive expansion to an existing use and would not diminish the cohesiveness or integrity of the Business District. Miller Hughes Ford is an established business located in the business core. The commercial operation pre-dates the Official Policy and regulatory document. The Planning Division has concerns regarding potential land use conflicts between the properties located to the south, however, it is conditionally favourable of the low intensive commercial expansion if stringent design techniques and regulatory controls are introduced during the Site Plan Approval Process.

Planning staff has prepared an alternative design which PAC members should take into consideration prior to rendering a decision, (Attachment V).

City Council promoted the opportunity for economic development at 711 Pitt Street by providing the automotive dealership with a grant under its HOTC CIP and Brownfield funding in 2011 in order to achieve Ford Canada Corporate imaging program. The proposed expansion will bolster the functionality of the existing main operation along Pitt Street and continued financial investment in the community.

Other Analysis and Input, including Zoning:

A full circulation to City Departments and Agencies for comments has been conducted, as a result of the request to change the O.P. designation and zoning.

General (conditional) support exists for the O.P.A./rezoning action in response comments (see Section D of Report).

Zoning

The parcel is located on the fringes of the Business District (B.D.) and Commercial 12 (COM 12) zone located to the west and north.

The proposal before the Planning Advisory & Hearing Committee is to concurrently change the zoning from Institutional 10 (INS 10) to Commercial 12 (COM 12) in order to introduce an extension to the existing established automotive dealership, the stand alone parking lot will be used solely for parking of their inventory (vehicles). The designated area will not contain a building, accessory structure, storage trailer or garbage receptacle. Vehicle delivery will continue to occur along the Pitt Street corridor and will not be permitted to access the site via Sydney Street. The intended use of the lands will be low intensive in nature.

The current zoning of the lands is Institutional 10 (INS 10) which allows for a variety of land uses to establish which include, residential and institutional type uses such as; single and multi unit residential developments, boarding/rooming houses clinics, churches, hospitals, private clubs and senior residences.

The proposed zoning of the lands to Commercial 12 (COM 12) will allow for a variety of land uses to establish which include; private and public parking, automobile showroom, new and used car lots, etc.

The majority of the overall property is vacant Greenfield land which potentially could be sold and developed with any of the above mentioned land uses. Depending on the scale of a future development, building(s) and an associated parking area would have to be introduced in order to accommodate the proposal. A future development could have a more direct impact to abutting land uses. The Site Plan process and guiding policies would still apply in this scenario and City staff would examine items such as land use compatibility, massing of the building, lighting, vehicular accesses, landscaping, fencing, noise and vibration etc. Mitigation measures would be applied to the proposal in order to offset negative impacts to existing southerly residential land uses.

Public Input/Commentary

The Wesleyan Church canvassed the properties in the vicinity, included were properties on Sydney Street and Seventh Street and those properties across Sydney Street opposite of the subject site. The initial response from every individual was positive, however, the property owner located directly to the south fronting Sydney Street has changed his opinion, (Attachment IV).

The Public Notice was circulated and Planning staff has received concerns from abutting residential landowners located along the south and east limit of the subject lands. These concerns were in respect to increased nuisances as a result of the introduction of the parking area specifically; lighting, loss of privacy, noise, heavy transports, diminished land value and visual loss of green space. Planning staff takes all concerns seriously and has conveyed the concerns to the proponent and consultant. At this time, Planning staff met with 2 concerned residents to discuss the development site, and as a result of the meeting they no longer have concerns with the proposal.

Design Alternative - Option 2

Planning Staff has prepared a second option and would ask that the Planning Advisory & Hearing Committee members consider the proposed as an alternative, (Attachment V). Planning suggests a reconfiguration of the parking area towards the north and west limit of the Wesleyan Church site, and restricted access solely to the automotive dealership by removing the Sydney Street access. This alternative design will minimize the impact to the residential property facing Sydney Street as the designated parking area will be recessed at the rear of the property away from the frontage maintaining the green space and leaving ample room for future development opportunities. Staff has presented the design alternative, Option 2 to the proponent and it will be discussed in depth at a later date with the consultant and Wesleyan Church. Initial reactions from the proponent is to proceed with the original proposal as he wants access to Sydney Street.

Other Technical Reports:

Environmental Report Phase 1: The Qualified Person (QP) has concluded that an ESA Phase 2 be conducted on the development site.

Archaeological Assessment Stage 1: The consultant has recommended that a Phase 2 Archeological Assessment. As a result of the findings, the proponent will be required to proceed with a Stage 2 Archeological Assessment.

Preliminary Servicing Brief: Not received, there is adequate infrastructure in the immediate vicinity to accommodate the site.

F. CONCLUSION

The principle of commercial development is to be established through this application. Already lands to the west and north of the subject property enjoy a commercial designation and zone. The subject parcel is located on the fringe area of the Business District.

The proposed low intensive commercial expansion is consistent with the PPS and a strong majority of applicable Official Plan policies.

General conditional support exists for the proposal amongst departments and agencies and as a result of the Public Notice, a number of concerns were received mainly regarding buffering from the abutting south and east residential land uses. It is important to realize that the developments are subject to the Site Plan Control process such that review of buffering, servicing, lighting, landscaping and traffic issues are satisfactorily addressed.

Finally, the proposal represents a continued investment commitment in the municipality, which should not be detrimental to abutting residential land uses if stringent mitigation requirements are implemented during the site plan process.

1.0 INTRODUCTION

This Report has been prepared in support of an application by 1271450 Ontario Ltd. cob as Miller Hughes Ford Sales Ltd. for amendment to the Official Plan and Zoning By-law for part of the property at 780 Sydney Street currently owned by Cornwall Wesleyan Church. The property is under an agreement of purchase and sale for conveyance as an addition to the existing automotive dealership on the abutting property at 711 Pitt Street.

The purpose of the applications is to enable the existing automotive dealership to add about 0.4ha of land to its site for the sole purpose of providing additional temporary storage of vehicles offered for sale.

1.1 SITE LOCATION




Figure 1 – Site Location

The site is located on the west side of Sydney Street, north of Seventh Street East as shown on **Figure 1** to this Report. The site is irregular in shape, having 27 meters of frontage on Sydney Street, a depth of 106.7 meters and an area of 0.4 hectares.

Sydney Street is a three lane, one-way north bound arterial road.

1.2 SITE CONTEXT

To the west of the land subject to this application is Miller Hughes Ford Ltd., an automotive dealership that has been located at 711 Pitt Street for over 60 years.

To the immediate north is the balance of the Cornwall Wesleyan Church property that extends to Eighth Street East. The mail building on the site is a former school. Part of the church parking lot extends onto the land that is the subject of this application.

To the south of the subject site is one single detached dwelling fronting onto Sydney Street and 4 single detached homes fronting onto Seventh Street East. Some of these dwellings have been converted to multi-family rental units.

Across Sydney Street from the site are single detached dwellings.

At the intersection of Pitt Street and Seventh Street is a node of automotive related businesses. At the north-east corner of the intersection is the Miller Hughes Ford Dealership. At the north-west corner is automotive collision center and temporary storage of vehicles and staff parking for the Ford dealership.

At the south-west corner is another automotive dealership (Volkswagen) and at the south-east corner is automotive parts supply outlet.

1.3 DEVELOPMENT PROPOSAL




Figure 2A – Concept Plan

These applications to amend the Official Plan and Zoning By-law as they apply to the south end of the Wesleyan Church property are for the purpose of enabling the existing automotive dealership to expand is site onto the property for the sole intention of providing additional temporary storage of vehicles adjacent to its dealership office at 711 Pitt Street. No staff parking is proposed on these lands. A driveway is proposed onto Sydney Street from the site. Access from Sydney Street will be controlled by a locked gate and the entire property is to be enclosed with a chain link fence for security purposes. Landscaping will be provided within the fenced area to provide separation distance and screening between the parked vehicles and the existing residences on Seventh Street and Sydney Street to ensure the new use of the site is compatible with the abutting land uses. A preliminary Concept Plan below as **Figure 2A and 2B** shows how the site could be used for the temporary storage of vehicles.

In terms of process, should these applications be approved, an application for consent to sever will be submitted to convey the land from the church's ownership to the owner of the automotive dealership as an expansion to its site. In addition, applications for Site Plan approval will follow that will address the layout and landscaping of the land to be conveyed to the automotive dealership as well as an application for Site Plan approval by the church to revise its parking lot abutting Sydney Street. Currently part of its parking lot encroaches onto the land to be conveyed to the automotive dealership.

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2.0 POLICY AND REGULATORY FRAMEWORK

2.1 PROVINCIAL POLICY STATEMENT 2014

The Provincial Policy Statement 2014 (PPS) under Section 3 of the *Planning Act* sets out key Provincial interests regarding land use planning. Decisions made by all approval authorities in the Province of Ontario must be consistent with the policies of the Statement.

Section 1.0 Building Strong Health Communities

Policy 1.1.1.a) states that healthy, liveable and safe communities are sustained by promoting efficient development and land use patterns that sustain the financial wellbeing of municipalities over the long term.

Policy 1.1.1.d) promotes cost-effective land use patterns and development standards.

The applications are consistent with these policies. Having the temporary storage of vehicles located adjacent to the existing successful dealership is an efficient and cost-effective use of land.

Policy 1.1.3.1 advises that settlement areas shall be the focus of growth and development, and their vitality and regeneration shall be promoted.

The City of Cornwall is a settlement area as defined by the PPS. Therefore, this site is in an area in which growth and intensification is promoted.

Section 1.1.3.1a) calls for municipalities to develop land use patterns that efficiently use land and services while avoiding the need for expansion of public services. This application will efficiently use land without the need to expand or upgrade public services (sewer, water, stormwater management) to accommodate the new use.

Section 1.3 of the PPS addresses employment.

Section 1.3.1 encourages municipalities to promote economic development and competitiveness by providing an appropriate range of employment uses to meet long term needs.

Section 1.3.1b) calls for municipalities to support economic development by, "providing opportunities for a diversified economic base, including maintaining a range and choice of suitable sites for employment uses which support a wide range of economic activities and ancillary uses, and take into account the needs of existing and future businesses."

These applications will enable the existing automotive dealership to meet its present and future need for the temporary storage of vehicles to support its continued success as an automotive franchise. This dealership has been in existence for over 60 years at 711 Pitt Street.

Section 1.6.6 of the Provincial Policy Statement addresses sewage, water and stormwater services.

Section 1.6.6.7 calls for stormwater management to be planned in such a manner that it minimizes a change in water balance or erosion. While the change of use to a parking lot will increase the amount of impervious material on the site, the release of stormwater from the parking lot into the City's storm sewer system will be on a controlled basis so as not to cause a change in the water balance in the City's storm sewer system.

Section 1.7 of the PPS addresses Long Term Economic Prosperity.

Section 1.7.1a) calls for municipalities to achieve long-term economic prosperity by "promoting opportunities for economic development and community investment readiness;"

Section 1.7.1b) urges municipalities to optimize the use of land and public service facilities.

Section 1.7.1.c) encourages municipalities to maintain, and where possible, enhance the viability of downtowns and mainstreets.

In 2011, City Council promoted the opportunity for economic development at 711 Pitt Street by providing the automotive dealership with a grant under its Heart of the City Community Improvement Program for façade improvements to the dealership building.

The use of this property for temporary vehicle storage is a means of optimizing the use of land by having the storage facility located adjacent to the dealership building.

In the City of Cornwall Official Plan, Pitt Street in this part of the City is recognized as a form of mainstreet where commercial activity is encouraged. Approval of these applications would enhance the viability of Pitt Street as a location of commercial activity.

In conclusion, approval of these applications is consistent with the policies of the Provincial Policy Statement 2014.



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2.2 CITY OF CORNWALL OFFICIAL PLAN

The site is governed by the City of Cornwall Official Plan that recently received Ministry approval in April 2018.

Schedule 1 Land Use places the site within the Business District. **Figure 3** is an excerpt of Schedule 1 showing the location of the site.



Figure 3 – Official Plan Schedule 1 Land Use

Schedule 1 Land Use designates the land subject to this application as Urban Residential while the adjacent land abutting Pitt Street with the existing automotive dealership is designated Business District.

The application to amend the Official Plan requests that the land subject to this application be redesignated from Urban Residential to Business District.

In Section 1, Scope and Type of Plan, the Official Plan is described as a Policy Plan – one of goals and policies and not a regulatory document. The Plan promotes the orderly development and redevelopment of the City.



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Section 1.5 states that the purpose of the Official Plan is to state the City's intentions toward its future development and redevelopment as a basis for future decisions, including providing the basis for changes to the Zoning By-law.

Section 1.6 speaks to the Official Plan being a 20-year plan.

Section 1.7 describes the Official Plan as being a non-static document – one that promotes the concept of continuous planning.

Section 1.7.2b) states one of the ways of achieving continuous planning is by "amendments to policies and Schedules of the Official Plan where such amendments are deemed to be in the overall interest of the City."

Section 2 of the Official Plan sets out the Basis of the Plan and Section 2.3 contains Strategic Directions including the protection and enhancement of the Downtown. The Business District designation applies to the City's Downtown area.

Section 2.4 states a number of assumptions that are relevant to these applications:

- > The City will continue as an urban major center within the Seaway Valley Region
- Most of urban growth will occur in existing designated areas
- > Cornwall will continue to operate as a regional service centre
- "People in Cornwall will continue to use the private automobile as a principal means of transportation." (Section 2.4.7)
- "The City will continue to promote, support and redevelop established Business Districts within the Community." (Section 2.4.10)

Section 2.5.1.17 states that a major consideration for reviewing development applications and proposed land uses is compatibility with adjacent land uses. The Section continues by stating that mitigation measures such as buffering, screening and landscaping can be used to reduce the potential conflicts between land uses. The Concept Plan prepared in support of this application provides an opportunity through the City's Site Plan approval process (which is required to implement the proposed change to the Official Plan and Zoning By-law) to incorporate these mitigation techniques to achieve compatibility between the proposed new use and existing adjacent land uses.

These planning applications support the achievement of three of the goals set out in Section 2.6.3 of the Official Plan. Specifically, Section 2.6.3.3 sets out the goal of expanding the City's economic base. Section 2.6.3.13 encourages "redevelopment, upgrading and efficient use of underutilized sites." Section 2.6.3.14 encourages the clustering of functionally related land uses. As stated earlier, there is well established cluster of automotive related uses at the intersection of Pitt Street and Seventh Street. For commercial development, Section 2.6.3.23 sets as a goal of ensuring the economic viability of the established Business and Commercial Districts. These applications will



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support the economic viability of the automotive dealership at 711 Pitt Street as part of the larger Business District that comprises the Downtown.

Section 3 of the Official Plan describes Growth Concepts and Policies.

Section 3.2.1 explains that the growth concept of the Official Plan is based on the principles that infilling and consolidation of existing urban areas should occur and that a more consolidated and compact urban for should be achieved. The subject applications are consistent with these principles.

One of the benefits of a compact urban form is that it would "promote strong established Business Districts by maintaining future development within easy reach of core areas." The current success of the automotive dealership at 711 Pitt Street is partly due to its proximity to the Downtown Core. Anecdotally, according to the automobile franchise owner at 711 Pitt Street, many of the patrons of the dealership find it convenient to drop off their car and walk to work at their place of employment in the Downtown core.

Section 3.3.5 refers to Schedule 1, Land Use in defining the limit of the designated growth area of the City. On Schedule 1, the site is within the Business District. Section 3.3.5.1b) describes the Downtown as one of the City's major employment areas. The dealership at 711 Pitt Street has a total of 31 full time employees.

Section 3.3.11 states that strong, established Business Districts serving the City with a hierarchy of commercial facilities and sub-districts is a vision of the Plan.

Section 3.3.15 encourages the clustering of functionally related land uses to be grouped together versus being randomly located across the City. In the Pitt Street corridor of the Business District designation, in addition to the cluster of automotive related uses at Pitt Street and Seventh Street, there is also a cluster of automotive related uses at the intersection of Pitt Street and Sixth Street where an automotive service centre and an automotive rental establishment are located. The planning applications filed for this site will support clustering of functionally related uses.

Section 4 of the Official Plan describes the Land Use designations on Schedule 1 and their respective policies.

Section 4.4 of the Official Plan addresses Commercial designations and indicated there are two commercial categories – Business District and General Commercial.

Section 4.4.2 contains a list of major goals for commercial land uses, some of which are relevant to this application;

One of the goals is to have commercially designated land that is suitably located in relation to the population to be served, adjacent land uses and transportation facilities and access. As the automotive dealership has successfully operated for over half a



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century at this location, there is no question that is appropriately located in relation to population served. The lands subject to the planning applications are compatible with adjacent land uses and are located on an arterial road.

Another goal is to concentrate businesses in geographic nodes and direct commercial development along arterial roads to these nodes. These subject planning applications reinforce to commercial activity at the Pitt Street and Seventh Street node.

In terms of General Policies for commercial designated lands, Section 4.4.3.2 contains a policy that the redevelopment of existing viable commercial areas should occur prior to the approval of new development areas. This application is supportive of expansion of an existing viable commercial area.

Another relevant policy, Section 4.4.3.5, is that adjacent land uses are to be protected from commercial development through matters that the municipality can influence through its Site Plan application process – the use of buffering and screening and diversion of site lighting spillage onto adjacent properties. Should the planning applications be approved, the City has the ability to ensure that adequate measures are in place to protect adjacent non-commercial uses through Site Plan control.

Section 4.5 is about Business Districts – the designation that applies to the automotive dealership at 711 Pitt Street and is requested to be designated on the land subject to this application. The description of the City's Business Districts is that they are characterized as being regional and city-wide centres. The portion of Pitt Street between Fifth Street and Ninth Street specifically noted in the Definition as being one of the Business Districts that has commercial continuity, older, unique and mixed land uses.

Included in the Business District Policies of Section 4.5.2 is the direction that the City should continue to encourage the Downtown Business District, in which this site is located, as a retail area for the City and the District.

There is also a policy in this Section that discourages uses that require large areas of land such as warehousing and major storage yards to locate in Business Districts. The use of 711 Pitt Street for the sale of automobiles predates the Official Plan. The sales and service building at 711 Pitt Street is a modest size building and is debatable as to whether it can be described as a large scale automobile sales and service dealership. Because of the dealership's proximity to the Downtown Core, the owner clearly prefers to expand his successful operation at this location than find another site away from the Downtown Core which is less convenient for many of its clientele.

Additional policies in Section 4.5.2 include creating a condition favourable to commercial growth by allowing greater use of property in the Central Business District. That is one of the reasons for these planning applications.



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It is also City Official Plan policy to support initiatives by local businesses to improve their facilities including grants under Community Improvement Plans. In 2011, Miller Hughes Ford received a grant from the City to improve the façade of the building as part of its planned dealership building expansion.

A final relevant commercial policy is that new development or redevelopment projects in the Business Districts should be compatible with existing development on adjacent lands. The concept plans show that with appropriate buffering, the proposed new temporary parking area for vehicles for sale is compatible with adjacent land uses.

Section 8 contains Economic Development policies. It is City policy in Section 8.3.1. to ensure there is an adequate supply of appropriately designated land to support growth. These applications request that the land supply be increased by a small amount in order to support the growth of the dealership.

Section 9.0 of the Official Plan, Urban Design addresses aesthetic issues in the City.

Section 9.3.2 looks to improve the visual qualities of the City. As no new buildings are proposed by these applications, buffering or screening is proposed between the proposed parking area and adjacent streets and existing residential land uses.

Section 14 of the Official Plan is the Implementation Section. The Section begins by stating that the Official Plan is not a static document and may be changed where conditions warrant and where the overall public interest is served.

Section 14.3 Official Plan Amendments contains a list of items, some or all of which applications requesting a change to the Official Plan, are to be evaluated against;

a) conformity with the overall intent, philosophy, goals, principles and policies of the Official Plan

This Planning Rationale Report shows that the requested change to the Official Plan to designate part of the site at 780 Sydney Street from Urban Residential to Business District is clearly in conformity with the Official Plan policies. The intent of the Official Plan is that the community is well served by appropriately located commercial uses. It is intended that Business Districts be successful areas of employment and service to the City and to the regional market. It is intended that new development be compatible with adjacent development and that, where appropriate, measures at the City's disposal, such as Site Plan Control, be used to provide appropriate buffering and landscaping where deemed necessary.

b) suitability of the location of the site or area for the proposed land use category especially in relation to other sites or locations in the City



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This site will enable a business that has successfully operated on a site for over 60 years to continue to operate and provide a higher level of service to its clientele.

c) compatibility of the land use classification with adjacent designations

Presently, all land on the west side of Sydney Street between Seventh Street and Eighth Street is designated Urban Residential and abuts lands designated Business District lands fronting onto Pitt Street that contain multiple commercial uses. These adjacent land use classifications have proven to be compatible over time. In a similar vein, it is felt that the proposed redesignation of the subject lands will also result in compatible adjacent land uses. The use of the subject site for the storage of cars does not result in the construction of new buildings nor does it result in significant activity on the property.

d) the need, and where deemed appropriate, market feasibility for the proposed use.

The existing automobile dealership at 711 Pitt Street is a highly successful business as proved by its longevity at this site. Additional temporary storage of cars on the land subject to this application will support the continued operation of the dealership at a location on the City that is supported by the policies of the Official Plan.

e) the extent to which existing designated areas are developed or are available for development

The owner of the dealership has examined alternative sites in the City and has determined that, from a business perspective it is better to continue to operate at this site where the present client base is attracted to because of convenience, than to seek an alternative location elsewhere in the City.

f) the impact of the proposed use on municipal services, treatment facilities and utilities, the transportation system, community facilities and the natural environment

The impact of the proposed Official Plan is negligible on City services. Stormwater runoff will be directed in a controlled manner to existing storm sewers. As no new buildings are proposed, there is no impact on the City's water system or on sanitary sewers. There is no significant vegetation the site that would be removed because of the approval of these applications. A locked gate at a driveway entrance onto Sydney Street from the site will limit the use of the driveway by cars.

g) the need to maintain an orderly development pattern

The approval of these planning applications will not result in a disorderly development pattern. Presently a portion the lands subject to this application are currently being used for parking purposes by the church.



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h) the economic benefits to the City

It is in the City best interests to have successful businesses operate at locations accessible to the public. The Pitt Street and Seventh Street intersection is an active and successful location of automotive related activity.

The financial investment the City made in 2011 under a Community Improvement Program grant for façade improvements is reaping economic benefits to the City as the automobile dealership is successful to the point that it needs additional temporary vehicle storage space by acquiring land from an abutting property.

i) the financial implications to the Municipality

The approval of these planning applications has no financial implications to the City in terms of the expenditure of public funds for matters such as servicing improvements or road widening. The City should receive some tax assessment increase as a result of the redesignation of land from its present institutional land use to a proposed commercial land use.

j) comments from City Departments and public agencies

At the time of writing this Report, the planning applications have not been filed with the City, and therefore, the comments from City Departments and public agencies is unknown.

k) precedents created by the amendment

We do not see any precedents created by the proposed Official Plan amendment. Presently in the immediate area of this site, the Business District designation extends to Sydney Street on some of the land between Sixth Street and Seventh Street and north of Eight Street to Ninth Street.

3.0 ZONING BY-LAW

The application for Zoning By-law Amendment that was filed concurrently with the application for Amendment to the Official Plan requests that the subject lands be rezoned from their present Institutional 10 Zoning that permits past and current uses include a church and a school to a Commercial 12 Zoning that applies the length of Pitt Street in this part of the City.

Figure 5 is an excerpt of the Zoning By-law that shows the zoning designations on this site and in the environs.



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Figure 5 – Zoning Map.

Permitted uses in the Commercial 12 Zone include an automobile showroom; a new and used car lot; a parking lot, public or private; a retail outlet for automotive supplies; a commercial garage; a vehicle rental agency.

Section 01-3-1 of the Zoning By-law requires that off-street parking required by the Zoning By-law for a permitted use must be located either on-site or within 150m of a lot containing a main use. In this instance, the proposed use is for the temporary storage of automobiles and not to provide parking to meet a Zoning By-law requirement for the size of the existing building. Nevertheless, the parking would be on-site if the planning applications are approved and the land is severed from the church property and added to 711 Pitt Street.

Section 01-3-3 requires that a landscape strip at least 3m wide be provided along a lot line abutting a street and at least 1m wide along any other property line.

The concept plan submitted showing the conceptual layout of the parking lot for the temporary storage of automobiles shows that these minimum requirements will not only be met but will be exceeded. The application for Site Plan control approval will have the final proposed landscape widths.



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Section 01-3-5 requires that a parking space measure 2.75m wide and 5.5m deep. A two-way driveway must be at least 6.7m wide. These dimensions were used in the creation of the concept plan of the temporary parking lot for automobiles that forms Figure 2 to this Report.

4.0 **CONCLUSION**

The application for amendment to the Official Plan and Zoning By-law by 1271450 Ontario Ltd. cob as Miller Hughes Ford Sales Ltd. for proposed parking lot for the temporary storage of motor vehicles has been thoroughly reviewed from a land use planning perspective.

It is our professional planning opinion that the applications should be approved for the following reasons;

1. Approval of the applications is consistent with the Provincial Policy Statement 2014.

2. The applications are in conformity with the overall intent, philosophy, goals principles and policies of the recently approved City of Cornwall Official Plan including the general criteria for evaluation of requests for change to the Land Use Schedule listed in Section 14.3.3 of the Official Plan.

3. The applications represent good land use planning.


4. It is in the public interest to approve these applications.

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

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

Re: Neighbourhood response to the sale of Land 780 Sydney St to the Ford Dealership



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

(PAC) GENERAL REPORT

PAC File #Z-05-19 and OPA No. 1 - The Planning Division received an Official Plan and Zoning By-law amendment application for the lands located at 780 Sydney Street on June 18th, 2019 . The proposal is to change the current Official Plan Designation from Urban Residential (U RES) to Business District (B.D.) and Zoning from Institutional 10 (INS 10) to Commercial 12 (COM 12) on the southerly portion of the subject lands, being approximately a (0.98 acre) parcel on Part of Lots 13, 14 north side of Seventh Street. This parcel will be formed with a larger (1.09 acre) lot to the immediate west to accommodate the Miller Hughes Dealership located at 711 Pitt Street.

A.) RECOMMENDATIONS:

That based on the proceeding report, it is recommended:

a) That the Planning Advisory & Hearing Committee (PAC) recommends to City Council to amend the Official Plan designation at 780 Sydney Street from 'Urban Residential' (U.RES) to 'Business District ' (B.D.), and amend the Zoning By-law from Institutional 10 (INS 10) to Commercial 12 (COM12) based on;

(i) The September 2019 modified proposal

b) That findings/recommendations of the various associated studies/reports included, be implemented to the satisfaction of the municipality and as part of the Site Plan Control approval process.

B.) BACKGROUND:

This item was presented at the July 29th, 2019 PAC meeting. The decision was deferred to a later meeting date in order to further evaluate the proposal and attempt to address the concerns received at that said meeting.

The City has a legislative time frame from the province (120 days) to provide the applicants with a response which expires on November 11, 2019.

Provincial Policy Statement is the primary provincial land use policy document which guides municipal decision-making. The Planning Act requires that decisions on land use planning matters be "consistent with the PPS" and municipalities are the primary implementers of the PPS through policies in their local Official Plans, Zoning By-laws and other planning related decisions. Those policies are supportive of this type of proposal and the consultant and the City are taking every step to mitigate any potential land use conflict.

C.) DISCUSSION:

Further to the PAC meeting held on July 29th, 2019, Planning staff met with abutting land owners and the applicants on two separate occasions; once on September 9th, 2019 and subsequently on September 25th, 2019. It was suggested that the owner of the lands (Wesleyan Church) invite the abutting land owners who were present at the July 29th PAC meeting to have further discussions on the proposal. Planning staff suggested that holding a constructive meeting at a neutral location would be beneficial and provide another opportunity to review the commentaries received and have in depth discussions on each item of concern.

The first meeting was held on September 9th, 2019 at Wesleyan Church Meeting Hall from 14:00 to 15:00. Those who were in attendance included the Applicants, Senior Planner, and 4 Residents.

The meeting began by thanking the land owners for their candor in voicing their concerns regarding the proposal presented at the July 29th PAC meeting. It was reiterated that Planning staff was in attendance to provide the development facts and not to champion the proposal. Further discussions took place with respect to the concerns expressed at the PAC meeting, specifically relating to heavy traffic, increased traffic volumes, buffering and loss of green space. Planning staff provided a thorough and in depth explanation of the proposal at hand.

A resident indicated that the neighbourhood was canvassed with a petition and signatures were received from land owners and tenants who opposed the proposal (Attachment VI). We asked for an associated letter and/or summary of what was presented to the individuals who were approached, and was told that there was no letter and it was verbalized. We asked the resident to summarize what was indicated during the conversations. The response received was contrary to what was presented at the PAC meeting and reflected in the staff report.

As a result of the information presented at this first meeting, Planning staff suggested that the applicants contact every individual identified on the petition. It was suggested that a second group meeting would be beneficial in order to provide further factual information and in depth explanation of the proposal. It was decided that an evening meeting take place at a neutral location so that more abutting land owners can attend and feel comfortable voicing their concerns in a productive and respectful manner.

A second meeting was held on September 25th, 2019 at the Wesleyan Church Meeting Hall from 18:30 to 21:30.

Those who were in attendance included the Applicants, Senior Planner, Development Planner, and 12 residents.

The Wesleyan Church sent out a letter to abutting land owners inviting them to a Public Information Session on September 25th, at 18:30 (Attachment IV). Planning staff provided copies of the presentation and the original PAC report. The Wesleyan Church provided a 10 year plan for the property highlighting the development potential (Attachment V). The meeting was well attended and the minutes have been included for review (Attachment I). Listed below are the main discussion points that were addressed:

Heavy traffic: Highlighted in the initial report and indicated during the July 29th, 2019 PAC meeting; transport trucks delivering inventory will remain status quo. The cars are dropped off along Pitt Street and will not be permitted to deliver inventory along Sydney Street. Heavy traffic volumes already exist along Sydney Street. The property has been evaluated by the City's Traffic Engineer who indicated that existing traffic volumes would not be affected as a result of the

proposed and modified inventory parking lot.

Removal of green space: As previously indicated, the property under the current zoning (INS 10) allows for a variety of land uses to establish and the green space area is private developable lands and not accessible to the public. Whether or not PAC decides to proceed with this application, the Wesleyan Church has the right to develop the lands in its entirety in compliance with the current zoning. The applicants will be subject to a Site Plan Control and will have to enter into a Site Plan Agreement with the City, depending on the nature of the proposal; mitigation techniques will still be applied.

Lighting: In support of the application for Site Plan Control, a Qualified Professional Engineer will provide a photometric plan which is the best way to analyze lighting solutions in a given area as it determines the distribution of light that is outputted and how it is dispersed on the development site. We ensure non reflective lighting is applied to avoid light migration onto abutting lands.

Site Design / Buffering / Site Modifications: The purpose of this parking lot is that it will be solely used for parking of inventory vehicles, which will eventually move as the cars will be sold and shipped out. The applicant has confirmed and reiterated that Miller Hughes Ford currently receives on average 300 vehicles throughout the year. Currently the City's data indicates that the Average Annual Daily Traffic (AADT) counts along the arterial between Seventh Street and Sydney Street heading north towards Ninth Street are the following;

- Sydney Street Movement North = 8000

- Seventh Street Movement East and North = 2000

On average, there are 10,000 vehicles travelling in front of the development site on Sydney Street.

Planning staff has prepared an alternative design to eliminate those parking areas, and frontage will be increased by approximately 35 – 40 feet heading west. More green space will be introduced to create a corridor effect fronting the inventory parking area. The proposed modifications to the entrance along with the introduction of vegetative elements will aesthetically enhance the frontage and perimeter. The driveway corridor has been introduced so that no inventory will be seen, it will also eliminate cars from stacking and idling on Sydney Street fronting the site. From a traffic perspective, the corridor option is a good design.

The Wesleyan Church will create a physical delineation with their existing driveway to the north. The introduction of an aesthetically pleasing fence will be

introduced along the entire north limit.

Planning staff invited the individuals who attended the September 25th, 2019 Public Information Session to either call or visit the Planning office to discuss the proposal on a one-on-one versus a group setting. Planning staff has not been contacted by abutting land owners since the last Public Information session.

F.) CONCLUSION:

The principle of commercial development is to be established through this application. Already lands to the west and north of the subject property enjoy a commercial designation and zone. The subject parcel is located on the fringe area of the Business District.

The proposed low intensity commercial expansion is consistent with the PPS and a strong majority of applicable Official Plan policies.

General conditional support exists for the proposal amongst departments and agencies and as a result of the Public Notice, a number of concerns were received mainly regarding buffering from the abutting south and east residential land uses. Planning staff has met with abutting land owners on a few occasions to discuss the proposal and presented a modified plan.

It is important to realize that the developments are subject to the Site Plan Control process such that review of buffering, servicing, lighting, landscaping and traffic issues are satisfactorily addressed.

Finally, the proposal represents a continued investment commitment in the municipality, which should not be detrimental to abutting residential land uses if stringent mitigation requirements are implemented during the site plan process.

PUBLIC INFORMATION SESSION

Date: September 25, 2019 at 6:30 pm

Location: Wesleyan Church - 780 Sydney Street

Public Attendees: Fourteen (14) landowners.

Pastor Blakely welcomed Senior Planner Karl Doyle and Development Planner, Kaveen Fernando; a prayer ensued.

Karl Doyle thanked all attendees and advised that a Planning Advisory & Hearing Committee (PAC) meeting had been held on July 29th and a subsequent meeting took place at the Wesleyen Church on September 9th, 2019 to review items discussed at the PAC meeting.

He indicated that the goal of this meeting is to present facts and provide concise information to all affected landowners so that they can clearly understand the project in its entirety and also be aware of the implications it will have on surrounding abutting lands.

Concerns heard at PAC from abutting landowners were mainly with respect to heavy traffic, transport, lighting, landscaping, and green space.

Due to comments and concerns received at the July 29th, 2019 PAC meeting, the proposal has been re-examined and Planning has prepared a new design. The changes will be discussed at this meeting as well as be presented at the October 22nd, PAC meeting. All concerns have also been recorded and the city will ensure that they are addressed during the development approval process.

Karl provided a brief overview of the July 29th PAC meeting presentation and copies of the report were made available.

Mr. Shawn Maloney, owner of Miller Hughes Ford located at 711 Pitt, approached Wesleyan Church to acquire just less than one acre of the Wesleyan Church lands to develop an ancillary parking lot for vehicle inventory.

The report indicated that the application is requesting to designate and rezone the southerly 0.98 acre portion of the property located at 780 Sydney Street from Urban Residential (U RES) to Business District (B.D.) and Zoning from Institutional 10 (INS 10) to Commercial 12 (COM 12) to accommodate a low intensive commercial parking lot.

Presently, Miller Hughes' zoning and site can be redeveloped and severed to accommodate an intensive permitted land use under the INS 10 zone without having to go before the PAC to seek modifications to the zoning and OP designation.

If successful with the Official Plan and By-law amendments, the intent will be to subsequently proceed with a consent application in order to create the 0.98 acre (Sydney St.) site and amalgamate the additional parking lot with the existing auto dealership located on Pitt Street. This parcel will be merged with the 1.09 acre parcel (Pitt) to the west totalling approximately 2.07 acres.

An alternate plan was created to alleviate concerns with respect to traffic and was presented at the July 29th PAC meeting. The plan demonstrated a reconfiguration of the parking lot to the north, however due to the purchase and sale agreement between both parties, this alternate plan was not a viable option.

If approved, Mr. Shawn Maloney and Pastor Blakely properties will be subject to a Site Plan Approval. The City will review both properties and ensure that all traffic; engineering, planning, fire code regulations and requirements are adhered to.

An important item for the city is to maintain and ensure there is appropriate separation between land uses. Typically on a property, a one meter landscaping buffer is required between land uses. Instead of one meter, the applicant is proposing four meters (instead of 3'ft. they are proposing 12' ft.). The landscaped area will consist of grass and vegetative elements.

At the July PAC, Planning staff supported the original option as well as the alternate option. Even though the alternate option is no longer an option, Planning is still conditionally supportive of the first option and by the end of this meeting a new design will be reviewed and will hopefully further mitigate received concerns.

The designated area cannot be used to store tires, cannot contain a building, accessory structure, storage trailer or garbage receptacle. Vehicle delivery will continue to occur along the Pitt Street corridor (remain status quo) and will not be permitted to access the site via Sydney Street. Property cannot be used as a through lot (access to a parcel from two different access points) e.g. Sydney and Pitt for instance). There will be a controlled gate access and area will not be accessible during non operational hours. Access will be denied to the site after 7:00 pm and the intended use of the lands will be low intensive in nature.

PAC opted to defer the application and their reason for the deferral was to revisit the configuration of the proposal and make an attempt to come to a consensus/agreement with abutting landowners. The City has a legislative time frame from the province (120 days) to provide the applicants with a response which expires on November 11, 2019.

A Public Notice will appear in the September 28 Saturday edition of the Standard Freeholder as well as on the city's website. The residents located within a 400' ft buffer of the area will also receive a letter notice in the mail prior to the October 22nd PAC meeting.

Karl addressed the following controversial items:

Heavy traffic

Hightlighted in the report and indicated during the meeting; transport trucks delivering inventory will remain status quo. The cars are dropped off along Pitt Street and will not be permitted to deliver inventory along Sydney Street. Heavy traffic volume already exists along Sydney Street. The property has been reviewed by the City's Traffic Engineer, and as a result of reviewing the proposed inventory parking lot, the existing traffic volume will not be affected.

Removal of green space

Karl listed the current land uses and advised that the green space area are private developable lands and are not accessible to the public. Whether or not PAC decides to proceed with this application, the Wesleyan Church has the right to develop the lands in its entirety without PAC or Council's approval. They would still be subject to a Site Plan control and have to enter into an agreement with the City, depending on the nature of the proposal; mitigation techniques would still be applied.

Lighting

In support of the application for Site Plan Control, a qualified professional engineer will do a photometric plan which is the best way to analyse lighting solutions in a given area and determines the distribution of light that is outputted and how it is dispersed on the property for the project. So the way we achieve this is to introduce non reflective lighting.

The purpose of this parking lot is that it will be solely used for parking of inventory vehicles; which will eventually move as the cars will be sold and shipped out.

Provincial Policy Statement is the primary provincial land use policy document which guides municipal decision-making. The Planning Act requires that decisions on land use planning matters be "consistent with the PPS" and municipalities are the primary implementers of the PPS through policies in their local Official Plans, Zoning By-laws and other planning related decisions. Those policies are supportive of this type of proposal and the consultant and the City are taking every step to mitigate any potential land use conflict.

- Planning staff have prepared an alternative design to eliminate those parking areas and frontage will be increased by approximately 35 –40 feet heading west
- More green space will be introduced to create a corridor effect. Vegetative green space will be well maintained
- Driveway corridor will be created so that no cars will be seen. This corridor will eliminate cars idling on Sydney Street.
- The Wesleyan church will create a physical delineation with their existing driveway. A nice fence will be introduced along the entire limit. From a traffic perspective, the corridor option is a good option.

These items will be recommended at the October 22nd PAC meeting.

Public was addressed for questions.

Serge had concerns with the lighting and stated that Mr. Maloney's existing lights spill over and are impact his property. He wanted to make certain that the lighting guidelines and standards will be followed and not neglected. Following the meeting Mr. Maloney and City staff went to the dwelling to verify the light concerns from 711 Pitt Street and the light shining in the second storey bedroom is emitting from the street LED light standard across the street on the west side fronting Sydney Street.

Karl replied that the City will institute light standards to those specs and that the lights which will be used will be non reflective lighting.

Pauline asked if the space is supposed to be used only for parking inventory vehicles; why is the gate necessary. She suggested that only a fence could be installed and the green space untouched all the way up to Sydney Street. She felt that the gate was not needed.

Karl replied that the goal is to have an internalized access; so when the cars are off loaded from the site, the customers are still able to come in.

Lenny stated that this proposal will not affect the traffic flow and was supportive of the development.

Linda had concerns that even with the new greenery she would be able to see vehicles from her property's porch.

Karl replied that a physical barrier and vegetation will be introduced. This is going to remain green space and a 5 - 6 ft. fence will be introduced.

Karl added that this internal access it's going to be designed in such a way that people coming to his business will have to manoeuvre through it.

Carol had concerns with respect to the 2021 Sydney Street reconstruction/expansion. She also asked what will be the benefits of this parking lot to abutting landowners.

Karl replied that there will be big improvements to the area and the city will be proceeding in stages. The existing sidewalks, curbs, access points, and asphalt will all be enhanced. When construction takes place, all residents on Sydney will be notified by the Engineering Division and landowners will have a chance to look at the design and provide input.

He also wanted to touch on a commentary received with respect to a property value diminishing due to the introduction of a parking lot. He indicated that the property's assessment will not change as assessments are based on land use and not on other factors surrounding the property.

Furthermore, he added that the applicants have made concessions and have gone over and beyond with respect to introducing a driveway corridor, vegetative and landscaping elements to further buffer and beautifying the area, and a physical separation by incorporating a fence. The applicants are listening to landowners' concerns and through design they can mitigate many land use conflicts. A low intensive parking lot already exists there now, and in a way it is a reconfiguration of that parking lot.

Robert suggested that this would be a great opportunity to introduce charging stations.


Karl added that there will also be no signage; it will be in the Site Plan Agreement. This will be reflected in the supplementary report going to the October PAC as well as be included in the Site Plan agreement.

Carol skeptic whether the opinions expressed by the public will really matter to PAC/Council members.

Karl indicated, PAC members will base its' decision again on the merits of the application, input received from city staff and from the public. The public has been heard, and my follow up report that will be presented at the October PAC will reflect discussions that took place at the meeting two weeks ago, this evening's meeting, the modifications/changes that were made to the plan, the concerns expressed and how

they were addressed. If approved, anyone who disagrees has the right to appeal, but the bases of the objection have to be well founded from a PPS perspective.

He thanked everyone for taking the time to attend and for providing input. He invited everyone in attendance to contact him and/or drop by the office if they would prefer to express their concerns one-on-one instead of in a group setting.



PART C - THE APPENDICES	The Appendices do not constitute part of this Amendment. These Appendices may contain the background data, planning considerations and public involvement associated with this Amendment.

PART A - THE PREAMBLE

a.) <u>Purpose</u>:

The purpose of this Amendment is to re-designate approximately 0.4ha (0.98) acres of land at 780 Sydney Street from "Urban Residential" (U. RES) to "Business District" (B.D.) Designation. The property is situated on Part of Lots 13 and 14 North Side of Seventh Street and together with an abutting 1.09 acre parcel to the immediate west will form a combined 2.07 acre (.84 hectare) site to accommodate an expansion to the Miller Hughes Car dealership.

b.) Location:

The lands affected by this Amendment are legally described as Part of Lots 13 and 14 North Side of Seventh Street, municipally known as 780 Sydney Street, and constitute approximately 0.4 ha (0.98 acres) west of Sydney Street and north of Seventh Street East.

c.) <u>Basis</u>:

The lands affected by this Amendment are designated as "Urban Residential" (U.RES), which typically promotes residential, institutional development with limited commercial. The re-designation to "Business District" represents a reasonable infill development due to it's association with the commercial activity located directly to the west fronting on a commercial corridor.

The proposed expansion to the long standing commercial development is consistent with other existing land use activities in the general vicinity and will be extensively buffered from existing residential land uses to the south and east, located along Sydney and Sixth Street.

Applicable Provincial Policy Statements (PPS's)

The Provincial Policy Statements (PPS) directs municipalities to consider development which, in part, is consistent with the following examples:

i.) Policy 1.1.1. - Healthy, liveable and safe communities are sustained by:

"a.) promoting efficient development and land use patterns which sustain the financial well-being of the Province and Municipalities over the long-term

g.) ensuring that necessary infrastructure....are or will be available to meet current and projected needs..."

e.) promoting cost-effective development patterns and standards to minimize land consumption and servicing costs;

The establishment of this land use in close proximity to a long-standing commercial area is compatible with these policies if the configuration of low intensive designated parking area ancillary to the Miller Hughes development is modified to address valid concerns received from abutting land owners in respect to buffering, lighting and heavy transport access.

Policy 1.1.2 - Within settlement areas, sufficient land shall be made available through intensification and redevelopment.

The area in question is located within the settlement area, the proposed redevelopment and intensification of the lands is promoted. The low intensive commercial use will solely be used for parking of inventory (vehicles).

Policy 1.1.3.2(a)(b) - Land use patterns within settlement areas shall be based on:

(a) efficiently use land and resources;

(b) are appropriate for, and efficiently use, the infrastructure and public service facilities which are planned or available, and avoid the need for their unjustified and/or uneconomical expansion;

The property backs directly onto the Commercial Business District, there is an opportunity for a land assembly which will allow for direct access to the applicants commercial site. There is available existing infrastructure along Sydney Street or via the Miller Hughes which will not necessitate unjustified or uneconomical expansion of infrastructure.

Land Use Compatibility - 1.2.6.1 Major facilities and sensitive land uses should be planned to ensure they are appropriately designed, buffered and/or separated from each other to prevent or mitigate adverse effects from odour, noise and other contaminants, minimize risk to public health and safety, and to ensure the long-term viability of major facilities.

Policy 1.1.3.4 - Appropriate development standards should be promoted which facilitate intensification, redevelopment and compact form, while avoiding or mitigating risks to public health and safety.

Even though there is no major facility being proposed, the development site abuts sensitive land uses. When considering the nature of the proposed use of the lands, during the site plan process the City will ensure a stringent amount of mitigation measures will be introduced to minimize any potential land use conflicts.

1.3.1 - Planning authorities shall promote economic development and competitiveness by:

b) providing opportunities for a diversified economic base, including maintaining a range and choice of suitable sites for employment uses which support a wide range of economic activities and ancillary uses, and take into account the needs of existing and future businesses;

d) ensuring the necessary infrastructure is provided to support current and projected needs.

If the applicant is successful obtaining the required development approvals it will enable the existing automotive dealership to meet its present and future needs for the temporary storage of vehicles to support its continued success as an automotive franchise. This dealership has been in existence for over 60 years at 711 Pitt Street, and has limited storage area both on the dealership site and lot on the west side of Pitt Street. City Council promoted the opportunity for economic development at 711 Pitt Street by providing the automotive dealership with a grant under its Heart of the City (HOTC) Community Improvement Program and Brownfield funding in 2011 in order to achieve Ford Canada Corporate imaging program.

1.7 Long-Term Economic Prosperity

1.7.1 Long-term economic prosperity should be supported by:

a) promoting opportunities for economic development and community investment-readiness;

The "PPS's" collectively promote infilling and intensification and the addition of the subject lands to the already established car dealership, will represent completion of development in a high profile location on one of Cornwall's main transportation corridors to the City. This form of infill redevelopment is consistent with the PPS.

Applicable Official Plan Policies:

The parcel is presently designated 'Urban Residential' similar to the land uses located to the south and east side of Sydney Street.

Planning Principles

2.5.1 The following principles are considered to be fundamental planning concepts and form the basis for more detailed goals and policies:

2.5.1.17 A compatible Land Use pattern should be promoted

One of the major considerations for reviewing development applications or locating land uses should be compatible with adjacent land uses. In some cases the conflicts between land uses can be reduced through such measures as buffering, landscaping, screening and sensitive sitting and massing of buildings. Opportunities for redevelopment of existing non compatible sites or uses to more compatible uses should be sought out and encouraged.

No major development is being planned; the proposed low intensive commercial parking use can be well incorporated into the existing property. Regulatory measures and stringent buffering and design principles will be examined during the site plan approval process in order to mitigate land use conflicts between the lands to the south.

2.6.3 (2)(4)(13) Goals General

Encourage the infilling and consolidation of existing urban development areas and promote the efficient utilization of existing municipal services.

Encourage the revitalization and appropriate redevelopment of core established Business Districts.

Encourage redevelopment, upgrading and efficient use of underutilized sites and neglected land. Environmental Site Assessments (ESA's) shall be conducted if contamination of such neglected lands is suspected and the filing of a Record of Site Condition (RSC) where required by the City or Ministry of the Environment and Climate Change (MOECC).

The proposal is in keeping with the aforementioned policies. The location of the subject site is located on the fringe area of the business core and would be considered as an extension to an established business onto vacant unfertilized lands. An ESA Phase 1 of the subject site has been submitted and the Q.P.'s recommendation is to proceed to a Phase 2 assessment.

3.2 (a)(d)(e) Goals and Principles

A more consolidated and compact urban development pattern is more cost efficient for the City and its taxpayers and would:

- ensure that the future development blends in with existing neighbourhoods;

- contain urban growth within the urban settlement area;

- promote the strengthening of strong established Business Districts by maintaining future development within easy reach of core areas;

The applications are in keeping with these policies, as highlighted by the consultant;

"One of the benefits of a compact urban form is that it would "promote strong established Business Districts by maintaining future development within easy reach of core areas." The current success of the automotive dealership at 711 Pitt Street is partly due to its proximity to the Downtown Core. According to the automobile franchise owner at 711 Pitt Street, many of the patrons of the dealership find it convenient to drop off their car and walk to work at their place of employment in the Downtown core."

4.4 Commercial Designations

4.4.3 (4)(5)(6) General Policies

In order to achieve the goals for commercial land use, it will be the intention of the City to:

- ensure that new commercial development and redevelopment are in accordance with acceptable site plan approval procedures and principles.

- ensure that adjacent land uses and districts are protected from commercial development through appropriate measures such as buffering and screening, control over open storage, signs and outdoor display, diversion of illumination, maintenance of properties, massing and placement of buildings.

- require commercial developments to provide appropriate landscaping adjacent to streets and within the interior of the site.

The Official Plan Section 4.5 provides long-term land use direction for Business District activity through samples of the following policies:

The Planning analysis concludes that the Business District designation is found in areas of concentration of retail, recreation, housing, hotels etc. Pitt Street generally between Fifth and Ninth Street is recognized as one of the Business district area. In this case, the subject lands abut the designation.

4.5.2(4)(12)(13) Business District Policies

In order to achieve the goals for the Business Districts, it will be the intention of the City to:

- discourage the use of land and buildings in the Business Districts for the purposes of industry, warehousing, large scale automobile sales and service, support facilities, (outdoor) storage yards and similar uses which may diminish

the cohesiveness, integrity, or amenity of the Business District as an area with a high level of retail, office, institutional, Government, residential and recreational activity. The Municipality shall not pass by-laws to permit the development of such uses in the Business District.

- support initiatives undertaken by local landowners, merchants and other tenants, in developing ways to improve streetscapes, pedestrian facilities, building facades and properties in Business District areas and seek support of Senior Governments in upgrading of such areas. Such initiatives are often undertaken through activities of the Cornwall Heart of the City/Centretown Cornwall group, the Business Improvement Areas, and through the Community Improvement Plans.

- provide for the integration of new development or redevelopment projects in the Business Districts. Ensure that the nature and scale of new development or redevelopment is compatible with existing uses or approved development or redevelopment projects on adjoining lands. Ensure that adequate pedestrian and vehicular access to the site and open space is or will be made available and seek to improve the urban design of such areas, particularly along arterial streets with reference to the Urban Design Chapter and any urban design guidelines that the city may prepare.

4.5.2 (4) - The City's Official Plan Discourages the development use of land and buildings in the Business Districts for the purposes of industry, warehousing, large scale automobile sales and service, support facilities, (outdoor) storage yards and similar uses which may diminish the cohesiveness, integrity, or amenity of the Business District. Secondly, it also indicates that Municipality shall not pass By-laws to permit the development of such uses.

That being said, Miller Hughes Ford is an established business located in the business core. The commercial operation pre-dates the Official Policy and regulatory document. The Planning Division has concerns regarding a potential land use conflicts between the properties located to the south, however, we are conditionally favourable of the low intensive commercial expansion if stringent design techniques and regulatory controls are introduced during the site plan approval process.

Planning staff has prepared an alternative design which PAC members should take into consideration prior to rendering a decision.

City Council promoted the opportunity for economic development at 711 Pitt Street by providing the automotive dealership with a grant under its Heart of the City Community Improvement Program and Brownfield funding in 2011 in order to achieve Ford Canada Corporate imaging program. The proposed expansion will bolster the functionality of the existing main operation along Pitt Street and continued financial investment in the community. The "Commercial 12" zoning sub-category shall mean those areas with uses and 4.6.2.7 The City may require adequate buffering, screening or additional setback for particular uses where a General Commercial area adjoins residential areas in order to promote compatibility.

It is, therefore, the position of the City Planning Division that a re-designation is consistent with and conforms to policies found in the PPS's and for the strong majority the Official Plan. More specific regulatory direction/control is to be established in the Commercial 12 zone to be placed on-site.

Purpose

The purpose of this report is to provide Council with an update on the City's financial activities to the third quarter of 2019 and compare those activities with the 2019 Financial Plan.

Recommendation

That Council receive the third quarter Financial Results for the period ending September 30, 2019.

Financial Implications

Managers have reviewed their respective financial reports for the period ending September 30, 2019. The 2019 year end projection is based on results to September 30, 2019, forecasted to the end of the year.

Schedule I provides a summary of variances, both favourable and unfavourable projected to the end of the year. Overall, the City is on budget. A surplus in the amount of \$48,948 is estimated for the taxation budget.



The following items may have an impact on the budget and will continue to be monitored:

- Tax Refunds: As reported to Council, tax write-offs are exceeding budget. The City settled two long-standing tax appeals in 2019. The City has budgeted net \$1M for tax refunds. Currently, the City has refunded \$6,838,211 in tax dollars related to vacancies, adjustments, and Minutes of Settlement. The City has \$3.3M set up in a reserve to help offset these appeals, \$1.97M will be funded from the Working Reserve to be repaid over the next few years. The net variance would be funded by the operating budget.
- 2. 2019 Supplementary Taxation: Revenue is estimated at \$280,000 (budget \$400,000). In a year where supplementary taxation exceeds budget, the additional revenue is contributed to Working Reserves as per Policy. In a year where supplementary taxation is below budget, the variance is to the operating budget.
- 3. Investment Income: As reported through the commentary for Financial Services, interest revenue generated on City investments and bank balances is higher than expected due to favourable interest rates. It is estimated that Investment Income will exceed budget by \$75,000 at year end.
- 4. Winter Control: The snow clearing and removal expenditures are currently over budget at third quarter. Over the past several years, costs during fourth quarter have averaged \$462K. Winter control activities to the end of 2019 may trigger a deficit (estimated at \$93,000) for this department. Currently, the Winter Control Reserve has a balance of \$600K.
- 5. Building Permits: Permit Processing revenues, currently at \$1.55M are exceeding the 2019 budget of \$717,500. This is a result of several large permits, which were not known at the time of the 2019 budget. A surplus in permit revenue at year end will be contributed to the Building Surplus Reserve (permits) as per the Reserve and Reserve Fund policy.
- 6. Municipal Accommodation Tax (MAT): 2019 is the first full year for the MAT. It is anticipated that the revenue from the MAT will exceed budget by \$150,000. All MAT revenue is regulated to be used for Tourism activity. Any surplus in MAT revenue at year end will be shared based on the allocation formula with the Tourism Development Corporation of Cornwall.



A surplus in the amount of \$365,000 is estimated for Environmental Services Water and a surplus in the amount of \$174,000 is estimated for Environmental Services Wastewater. Projected variances are listed on Schedule II. Any variances to budget will be contributed to/funded by respective Reserves at year end.

Financial Services continues to work closely with all City Departments in monitoring financial activity to ensure that any action required to address negative variances in relation to the budget is considered.

The City is committed to protecting the integrity of the procurement process and taking appropriate measures to promote fairness, openness and transparency in this process. While the procurement process is open, elected officials are required to separate themselves from the procurement process and have no involvement.

The following details the circumstances where Council will provide feedback to Administration prior to the issuance of the RFP.

Criteria 1: The contract is estimated at \$150,000.01 or more Section 5.1 of the Procurement of Goods and/or Services Policy outlines that Council is required to award all procurements of \$150,000.01 or more. Criteria #1 is being recommended so that Council is familiar with the bid solicitation requirements prior to its issuance.

Criteria 2: A change in level of service is being considered Currently, level of service changes are reviewed and approved by Council at a regular meeting of Council or through the annual budget process. Criteria #2 is inline with the City's current process to introduce level of service changes to Council for consideration and approval.

Based on RFPs issued over the last several years, the following RFPs would meet the noted criteria:

- External Audit Services,
- Purchasing Card,
- Waste and Recycling Collection and Processing,
- Pharmaceutical Services Glen Stor Dun Lodge
- General Insurance Program and Risk Management
- Engineering and Design Consulting Services Wastewater Treatment Plant,
- Engineering and Design Consulting Services Water Purification Plant,
- Various one-time procurements for studies, engineering, design, consulting, etc.

Purpose

To present Council with information regarding a proposed city wide water meter implementation.

Recommendation

- 1.0 That Council receive this report and,
- 2.0 That Council direct Administration to develop a Water Conservation and Servicing Master Plan and fund the plan from the Water Works Reserve, and,
- 3.0 That the Water Conservation and Servicing Master Plan be presented to Council for consideration at a subsequent meeting.

Financial Implications

A Water Conservation and Servicing Master Plan includes an in-depth analysis of financial and forecast planning that would outline a rate structure that provides a



sustainable level of revenue when considering the net operating and capital costs and life-cycle planning for a water utility.

The survey indicated one strategy for funding the water meter project, to borrow for the purchase and installation of water meters and to have the debt paid back by homeowners over a 10 year period. The Water Conservation and Servicing Master Plan would include other financial strategies for the repayment of borrowed funds. This may include a structure so that payments for principal and interest borrowing costs are equal to the operational savings generated by the conversation of water. This approach was adopted with the LED street lighting project. Another strategy could be to set up a contribution to a Water Conservation Reserve to reduce the financial impact to ratepayers in the year that the capital project moves forward. Much like the financial structure set up for the Secondary Waste Water Treatment Plant.

The Water Conservation and Servicing Master Plan would also include scenarios: status quo (no residential water meters), a hybrid model (where those homeowners wanting a meter would be billed on a metered rate), and a full implementation model, city-wide over a period of two to three years.

Strategic Priority Implications

The strategic priority of *Being leaders in sustainability and climate change impact*, of the City's 2019-2022 Strategic Plan provides consideration for water meters.

Water meters is action item 3 in this strategic priority. Energy and chemical usage reductions would lower emissions and contribute to lower wear and tear, enhancing sustainability and climate change adaptation.

Background / Discussion

The City of Cornwall is the only community in Ontario with a population of over 40,000 that does not have water meters deployed city-wide with an accompanying volume based rate structure. The 2018-2019 Ministry of Environment, Conservation and Parks (MECP) inspection report noted that the City does not have a conservation program.

A volume-based rate structure provides to the customer an equity and choice based approach. The customer pays only for the water they use. The individual



customer can choose to adopt water savings ideas and that directly controls their billing. During the transition, there will be some customers who would see a decrease in the annual water bill and some customers that would see an increase.

The attached report presents the importance of water meters in the development of a conservation program. There are significant savings that can be realized with a conservation program. Water meters provide the measurement tool to monitor the effectiveness of the conservation initiatives. Water meter technology has advanced to allow for monitoring water usage in real time through transmitting of data using wireless technology.

This technology improves customer service (level of service) by providing customers with a web portal. With the web portal, customers can log into their account and get a visual of water usage. Daily usage over the past month can be viewed and comparisons to past usage can be easily created. This portal also allows the customer to create notifications if water usage changes. A useful example would be, if a customer historically does not use any water between midnight and 7am. The water meter portal could send an email saying check if a toilet valve is stuck as you used water last night and you typically do not.

This technology also allows the water distribution staff to monitor the water use and find leaks in the City's infrastructure more quickly. Similar to the example above, if a neighbourhood had no water usage after midnight, although water usage from the plant has gone up overnight, the leak detection staff would be dispatched. Reduction of leaks is a significant operational cost savings through reduced daily volume. In addition, since the leaks are found quicker, a greater percentage of repairs can be completed through scheduling. Fewer emergency repairs enhances customer service as more often repairs can be completed at times when shutting the water off to the customer doesn't inconvenience them.

There are several risks that can be reduced and opportunities realized with the installation of residential water meters as part of an overall Water Conservation and Servicing Master Plan.

Currently, the estimated daily residential per capita usage of drinking water in Cornwall is 450 litres per person per day. The average usage in Canada for residents who have water meters and a municipal conservation plan is 250 litres per person per day.



 Without starting the process to create a conservation program, the recommendation in the MECP annual inspection report could escalate and could result in a down grade from a 100% inspection rating. Cornwall is at 11 straight years of 100% ratings.

Opportunity

• Recommendation of Council for Administration to create proposal for a Water Conservation and Servicing Master Plan will show MECP that a plan is being considered.

Risk

2. Energy usage and chemical usage in the plants will remain higher than the national average.

Opportunity

• Operational saving of \$300,000 per year in power and chemicals once Cornwall achieves the Canadian average.

Risk

3. The Wastewater Treatment Plant (WWTP) currently operates at plus 85% of capacity during major rain and snow melt events. The MECP annual inspection for the WWTP has noted this as a concern.

Opportunity

• A reduction in water consumption would mean less water to the combined sewers, which directly reduces the overflows and would free up pumping capacity at the WWTP, which could be used to additionally reduce Combined Sewer Overflows (CSO). CSOs were 101,674 m3 in 2019.

Risk

4. Funding from senior levels of government for Energy Conservation and Demand initiatives, Climate Change Action initiatives, or water and/or sewage infrastructure would lose point potential on the evaluation of a funding application without a Water Conservation Plan without the ability to measure the effectiveness of the Plan.



• Funding for Energy Conservation and Climate Change greenhouse gas reduction and Climate Change adaption for water and/or sewage infrastructure projects would enhance Cornwall's infrastructure and further reduce operating and capital costs to the ratepayer.

Risk

5. Potentially millions of dollars in future capital expenditures directed towards the water and wastewater infrastructure will need to be invested by the costumer base in order to meet future water demand.

Opportunity

• Implementation of a water conservation plan will reduce, defer or eliminate future capital expenditures necessary to meet capacity needs at the water purification plant, the wastewater treatment plant, the water distribution system and wastewater collection systems.

Components of a Water Conservation and Servicing Master Plan

Upon Council approval, Administration would prepare a Water Conservation and Servicing Master Plan, which would outline specifics including but not limited to:


- Community outreach is a fundamental first step for increasing awareness and gaining public support for water demand management (WDM). Community outreach also plays a fundamental role in enhancing the planning and implementation success for most WDM initiatives. In other words, community outreach is a cross-cutting and ongoing WDM initiative. The community outreach would become part of the annual conservation program.
- Develop a timeline.
- > Develop a volume based rate structure.
- Determine a financing model.
- Develop business plans.
- > Develop procurement methodology ie. Request for Proposals, tenders etc.
- Develop an implementation plan.
- Provide extensive consultation with the public and stakeholders.
- > Conservation Incentive and Rebate Plan.



Survey Results

The survey design does not allow for statistical analysis as such only qualitative or subjective observations can be made from the results. The design of the survey was chosen as an initial first step that would provide some data for development of an outreach and education plan as part of the recommended Water Conservation and Servicing Master Plan.

Figure 1 presents the percentage of respondents who answered yes, no or unsure to the questions in the survey.



Questions:

- 1. Do you feel water meters can help conserve our drinking water supply?
- 2. Do you feel water meters and rebate/incentive programs can work together to conserve water?
- 3. Do you feel a household with a water meter would use less water than a non-metered household?



- 4. Do you feel water conservation can help keep water rates from increasing?
- 5. Knowing the water consumption information provided by a water meter installed at your household, would you implement measures to conserve water?
- 7. Do you feel water meters are helpful in order to monitor water usage if your bill contained consumption information similar to your electricity and natural gas bills?
- 8. Do you feel the actual consumption of municipal water recorded by a water meter would provide a more equitable billing mechanism? That is, householders would pay for what they consume.
- 9. Based on the consumption information (and associated charges) provided by a water meter installed in your home, do you feel you would initiate water conservation measures in order to minimize your water billing?
- 10. If the City implements a citywide water meter program, are you in favour of financing the program over 10 years at an estimated cost of \$95 per year per household?

Attached to the report are the comments that were added in response to Question 6 and Question 11.

The chart indicates there is a slight majority of people who were not in favour of water meters.

Questions 1-3 indicate that about 54% do not see water meters as being able to reduce water usage. The experience in other communities would suggest that this is the typical feeling before the outreach and education campaigns, and that after the outreach customer satisfaction surveys showed this percentage declined.

In answering question 4, 61% of respondents do not feel that water conservation would reduce costs. In understanding what may be behind these responses, here is some information from the comments provided. There is a significant number of comments that equate the rate billing (water and sewer) with tax and feel they pay enough tax. This coupled with a feeling that income in Cornwall is such that most can't afford any increases. This is important data for both the financing portion of a Master Plan and the outreach/education plan. Both will



evolve the challenge of understanding and communicating the cost savings that would accompany the Water Conservation and Servicing Master Plan.

In question 10, 77% of respondents were not in favour of an additional \$95 per year. A recalculation, more accurately indicated that the estimated cost over a 10 year period would be \$77 per year per account. Administration would bring to Council, as part of the Water Conservation and Servicing Master Plan, additional financing options.

Water security is one of the most tangible and fastest-growing social, political and economic challenges faced today. World Economic Forum, 2014







Water Meters, Conservation and Long Term Asset/Rate Sustainability

For consideration

The City of Cornwall currently does not have water meters installed throughout the municipality. According to available information, Cornwall is the only provincial municipality of equal size or greater in Ontario without a citywide metering system.


Data from the latest Statistics Canada survey of drinking water plants "Residential water use declined 12% from six years earlier, from 251 litres per person per day in 2011 to 220 litres per person per day in 2017." While per capita use in Cornwall can only be estimated, the data suggests that our usage is approximately 450 litres per person per day in the residential sector.

Do water meters contribute value to the community?

"If you can't measure it, you can't improve it." -Peter Drunker

This report describes and presents summary information of how water meters can contribute significant value to a community. This value is not obtained directly. For example, the installation of a water meter at a homeowner's property doesn't by itself save money or decrease rate increases. Although, the water meter is an essential element. The meter provides the information that lets everyone know where to look for improvements, where we create the most value and tells us when we can pat ourselves on the back, we are creating value and keeping things affordable (sustainability) while maintaining (conservation) what we have.

In other words, when we do many small things they act together to create something complicated. This report presents some of the pieces of the puzzle with water meters being a crucial piece, as it becomes the measurement tool.







Background

The City of Cornwall is the last municipality yet to adopt a consumption model, that is, pay for what you use. The primary benefit, as seen by customers, of a consumption model is equity. As payment is based on the volume or the amount of water used in a billing period. This model puts the resident and the Industrial, Commercial & Institutional (IC&I) sector in control of measuring their effort to reduce water consumption as daily/monthly water use is displayed in their billing. It is a choice based model. This will mean that some individuals would see a water bill decrease if they chose to use less water and those who chose to use more water for the things important to them, would pay more.

In addition, research on pay for what you use programs has shown to provide an economic incentive for behaviour change or modification. Water meters provide an economic poke.

A secondary benefit (close second) is the measurement tool that a water meter program provides. A city wide water meter program can measure the effectiveness of a conservation program, the effectiveness of a leak detection program, provide business case measurements for capital improvement programs and can provide data for prevention programs.

Water meters provide information

The water use information in it's various forms within the Urban Water Cycle is the first step in water management and is key to helping both the municipality and users understand how much water is being used and where.

Key questions for water usage include:

- Where is the water going?
- How much water is lost between withdrawal from the St. Lawrence and delivery to the customers? (both residential and IC&I)
- How much revenue is lost? Or how much water is lost through leaks?

Water Audits: Leak Detection and Revenue Loss Minimization

Without municipal wide use of water meters it is difficult to measure the water loss to the environment through leaks or other forms of loss. Water that is not delivered to a customer is an expense to the system and a waste. Reducing loss saves operating costs of the water treatment, distribution systems and the wastewater treatment plant. System water losses average 13 per cent across Canada, ranging from 7.5 per cent to 21 per cent. The MECP recommends a goal of 10% or less average water loss.

Halifax Water, as an example, through methodically tracking flows and leaks through standardized water audits, has reduced the amount of water the system requires with annual savings of \$600,000, partly due to the need to pump less water and use fewer chemicals in water treatment.





By limiting unnecessary or wasteful source water withdrawals, water authorities gain financial benefits through improved revenue recovery, less wear and tear on infrastructure, fewer service disruptions, and improved system integrity.

Water Meters and Conservation

In general, water meters are thought of as a method to decrease demand. Although, the benefits are more nuanced.

Beyond the obvious benefits of decreasing demand, water meters can help a municipality:

- > Track progress in municipal water conservation monthly, seasonally and/or annually;
- Identify high water users and areas of water loss, often "low-hanging fruit" solutions where monetary resources can be directed;
- Estimate water use by sector and employ "narrowcasting" techniques;
- Showcase your progress by comparing numbers with other similarly-sized communities or a national average;
- Provide essential management information to system operators in both water and other utilities (e.g. energy) for improved efficiencies; and
- Use the collected data for better long-term Urban Water Cycle planning through forecasting future water use and where best to invest through cost/benefit studies.

The following link from the Grand River Conservation Authority, provides practices that municipalities can implement to reduce the demand for water.

Conservation and it's Effects on Behaviour

Water Pricing Report:

2009 Statistics found that households on a flat rate system use 52% more water (361 litres per person per day) than households paying per volume of water used (238 liters per person per day). Although, this is somewhat misleading, as the water meter only provides information. The behaviour change occurs when the volume information is coupled with a public outreach and incentive program that explains for example that the highest water usage in a home is the use of toilets. So a rebate for a toilet change gives the incentive to change the toilet and the customer can see the reduction in water usage reflected in their billings. The "pay for usage" is the incentive to look for opportunities to purchase water reducing items. Meters are the essential first step providing the need/want to reduce volume and either reduce costs or offset a rate increase (home or business).





Conservation and its Effect on Rates

Volume-based rates give customers some cost control as people can change how much water they use (habit and behaviour changes) and/or buy more efficient water appliances (e.g. washing machines and dishwashers) and fixtures (e.g. toilets, showerheads and taps). Volume-based rates also encourage water conservation to everyone's benefit.

There is a common misperception that water conservation is the main cause for annual water and wastewater rate increases. While it is true that the City would receive less volume-based revenue as customers use less water, conservation saves a community far more money than it costs, both at the utility (municipal) level and the individual (customer) level. For the municipality, major capital projects are delayed or eliminated and conservation saves operating costs at the Water Purification Plant (WPP) and Waste Water Treatment Plant (WWTP) with the two largest being chemical and energy savings which lowers rate increases.

For example, the City of Guelph reports their investment over the last 10 years of \$10.2 million in water conservation and efficiency programs and resources has resulted in over 30 million in savings over that same period. That is, \$30 million in savings for the water rate payers, their customers, both residential and IC&I. The savings come in many forms:

- > from deferred infrastructure projects which are the annual capital projects such as:
 - New watermains in new developments, replacement watermains in older neighbourhoods, new pumping stations to get the water to new developments, new pumps in the water purification plant to get the treated drinking water to the new developments.

The water consumption savings through conservation efforts allows us to provide the water to the new projects with existing equipment.

- \checkmark from operating costs
 - Reduced electricity costs for not having to pump additional water at the WPP and generated wastewater at the WWTP.
 - ➢ for example, being able to turn off a pump because it's not needed due to the reduced consumption.
 - Reduced chemical costs that would have been needed for treating the extra water and generated wastewater.

Rebates and Consumption Programs to reduce Water Usage

Residents play a role in the Urban Water Cycle - from reducing residential water use, reducing residential wastewater use to harvesting rainwater and helping manage stormwater. The research tells us that rebate, incentive, water audits and other forms of public outreach and engagement are needed to get the water consumption reductions after the economic poke. This behavioural nudge





or poke creates a cognitive awareness where positive reinforcement (incentives) and indirect suggestions (public outreach) are used as ways to influence the behavior and decision-making. In other words, people look for something to do once they've seen the information that comes with the installation of water meters and consumption billing.

- Community outreach is a fundamental first step for increasing awareness and gaining public support for water demand management.
- Develop a conservation incentive program whereby City residents can apply for rebates when they purchase a rain barrel that helps save water, energy, and money by using rain water for outdoor applications.
- Develop a conservation incentive program whereby City residents can apply for rebates when they purchase low flow toilets, low flow shower heads and facets and when they purchase high efficiency washing machines.

See Appendix A for some examples of rebate and incentive programs.

In a following section, a technology opportunity is described should the City decide to create a city wide drinking water metering system.

Opportunity Cost of a Water Meter and Conservation Program

Without a municipality wide metering program it is difficult to know what the water losses might be within the municipality. Typically measuring the water losses through water audits and using that information leads to:

- Lower maintenance and operating costs;
- Increased revenue;
- Positively impact wastewater treatment capacity;
- Deferral of expensive capital projects for water treatment and wastewater treatment demand;
- Improved repair planning schedules;
- Lower risk of property damage by improving underground safety (reduced likelihood of sink holes for example); and
- Increase public trust in the water utility through fewer water outages resulting from water main repair.

If our municipality chose to deploy the Advanced Metering Infrastructure (AMI) described later to perform daily and monthly water audits, this data generated by AMI would assist with the leak detection program and move the preventative maintenance program to more of a predictive maintenance system. As well, the AMI system allows for easy measurement of the effectiveness of the program and allows for quick adjustments to the program.





Based on estimates that have been realized when communities in Ontario and Canada have installed water meters and begun the programs of conservation and improved asset management, the savings that could be expected from the investment is explained in the following paragraphs.

In Cornwall, operational savings (chemical and electrical) from the Water Purification and Wastewater Treatment plants is estimated to be approximately \$300,000 per year if the municipality could reduce from the current estimate of 400 liters per person per day to the 250 liters per person per day average as recorded in metered Ontario cities.

Based on estimates reported in Ontario and the American Water Works Association (AWWA), there could be an additional \$70,000 per year in operational savings. This saving could be realized from the reduction in leaks if meter information were used for water audits and the data utilized in the leak detection. Un-metered systems with a leak detection program typically have on average a 15% water loss through leaks, while metered systems are on average 10%.

Reduced flow from water conservation will result in reduced wear and tear on equipment, however this is somewhat difficult to estimate as this is a life cycle cost of equipment with a long asset life. The cost of repair crews time for an unscheduled repair, inconvenience cost to residents or businesses if the water outage is significant could be estimated in the order of tens of thousands of dollars. The average cost of one water main repair in Cornwall is \$7,000.

In summary, an investment in a water meter and conservation program would return significant savings over the 10 year forecast period. With the significant economic development potential of being "Open for Business" without the need for a significant capital project to increase treatment capacity. And as noted above, Guelph and every major municipality has realized savings greater than the investment.

2019 Technology Opportunities


It is likely interesting to consider that waiting until now to contemplate implementation of a water meter program allows the City to leap frog into technologies that are very efficient. For example, the technology described below which has only recently become available, collects the water meter data and transmits it to the billing software without the need for a technician to drive around the city and then upload the data.

The water meters now on the market allow for drive by or wireless communication options. The water meters currently installed in the City have first generation radio transmitters that require the Water Meter Technician to drive by at a low speed of less than 20 km/h. New meters allow for readings to be taken at normal vehicle speed (50 km/h) or transmitted to a wireless tower (like a cellphone tower) and transmitted directly to a computer.





Advanced Metering Infrastructure (AMI)



The system consists of a small, low-power radio frequency transmitter connected to your water meter that sends readings to a network of receivers throughout the system. These receivers provide all relevant billing information and eliminate the need for Water Meter Technicians to go door to door on a regular basis to manually take a meter reading. The Advanced Metering Infrastructure (AMI) system provides automatic meter reading as well as more accurate and responsive water consumption information to assist the municipality and customers in managing water use.

How it works

A small meter interface unit is integrated onto the water meter that combines radio and high resolution encoded register, replacing the old touch pad. It is connected to the water meter register located on your water meter and transmits a low-power radio frequency signal to a data collector which relays the information to the municipality's host software and then into Water Accounting software in taxation dept.

There is no personal data transmitted, only the meter read and the transmitter number. Once received by the municipality's host data management system computer, the data is paired with the billing account information and processed to create the utility bill.

What are the benefits of the AMI system?

There are two main advantages of AMI. One, Water Meter Technicians are focused on repair instead of meter readings and the AMI allows for a greater frequency of meter readings. Second,





the AMI system provides a web based account for users to login and see consumption and a place where notifications can be set up.

Upgrading to the AMI system will:

- * Allow your meter to be read remotely.
- * Improve customer service by providing timely data should reading/billing issues arise.
- * The new smart meters will utilize an AMI system to provide remote meter reading, data analysis and alerts for possible leak or flow problems. This real-time data will help ensure bill accuracy, and allows municipal staff and residents the ability to detect potential issues and avoid unnecessary water costs. These wireless water meters allow homeowners to manage water consumption, mitigating high or unintended water usage.

By combining telemetry data and modeling information water utilities can gain a more complete and accurate picture of their systems hydraulic and water quality operation and performance capabilities.

Business Case

Where are we?

Residential properties use a flat rate structure based on the number of fixtures. Although, there are a number of volunteer residential water meters, these meters are read annually or as requested by the resident. In addition, the readings are only provided to the volunteer resident if requested.

The IC&I sector uses both a flat rate system and a consumption model. IC&I's have their consumption read twice per year. 900 IC&I accounts are on flat rate and only 311 are on consumption billing.

When considering options it is often useful to look at the process used for the business case. The status quo is summarized below. The following sections in the report presents information on how water meters would help create programs to reduce the risk elements for the business case. The report concludes with a recommendation to develop an implementation master plan.

The business case for a water meter master plan would compare the following options:

Option 1: Status Quo

This option maintains the current business practices of the water and wastewater systems.

The benefits of the status quo follow:

1. The rate structure is established.





- 2. The billing system is established.
- 3. Billings in the flat rate account are predictable and increase each year based on inflation and Long Term Asset Management deprecation calculations

Risk to the status quo follow:

- 1. MECP 2018-2019 Inspection Report recommendation "measures should be considered to promote water conservation. This could include studies of current practices to determine how much water would be saved by implementing conservation measures." The body of this report contains a small summary of the current best practices for water conservation programs.
- 2. The City's Drinking Water Quality Management System (DWQMS) is regulated by the MECP. A new update of the DWQMS (entitled DWQMS 2.0) puts greater emphasis on the external and internal audit process. To be able to audit a conservation program a measurement needs to be developed and implemented. How do you audit a conservation program without a measurement? The body of this report describes the current best practice for water meters which includes technology that allows for easy data collection from the water meters and a city wide program would allow the conservation to be measure for effectiveness and adjusted (through the DWQMS continual improvement process) to obtain real measureable conservation.
- 3. The current meters in service in Cornwall need to be upgraded. It would be more efficient and cost effective to upgrade these meters at the same time as a municipality wide program.
- 4. Water loss due to leaks is unknown.
- 5. Combined Sewer Overflows (CSO) were 101,674 m³ in 2019. A reduction in water consumption would mean less water to the combined sewers which directly reduces the overflows and would free up pumping capacity at the WWTP which could be used to reduce CSO overflows.

Option 2: Status Quo with Conservation Plan

This option maintains the current business practices of the water and wastewater systems. The benefit being the rate structure is established.

The recommendation would be to introduce a rebate and incentive based on, for reference only, the Guelph model. These series of actions for toilet replacement, shower head replacement, water efficient appliances and conducting water audits. As part of the 2018 MECP water services inspection, the Ministry noted that Cornwall did not have a conservation program so this recommendation would address that deficiency/request/observation.





Option 3: Install water meters in all IC&I facilities and add Conservation Plan.

This option would create measurement and a volume based incentive for the major users of water within the municipality. This option creates a method for equity billing. This would improve tracking of water and use a revenue based model that would be available for Economic Development. This option would recommend as well the use of wireless towers for gathering of data. A benefit of the IC&I group would be a website tracking of water volume for the business and notification via email for an increase in water use that might indicate a leak in their system. The system would make tracking of any internal water conservation program of a particular IC&I easy and effective.

Option 4: Install water meters City wide and add Conservation plan with a leak detection system.

This option would create a volume based system for the community and create equity among users from a volume approach. All users would have the option of a web based method to monitor usage. As this option includes wireless transmission of data, the information would allow users to monitor the effectiveness of any water conservation program. For example, if a resident installed low flush toilets and low flow shower heads, they could login online and track how water use is trending down. In the IC&I sector, installation of new equipment could be tracked for water savings. This software includes a notification that can be sent to your email to notify you that water usage has spiked. For example, if the toilet valve doesn't shut off over night a resident would see an email in the morning saying maybe "Check for leaks". This notification in addition is sent to the Water Meter Technician who follow up to see if the resident or IC&I customer is aware of the leak notification. In that way, there are no surprises come billing time and customer service is enhanced. In addition, this usage information has a property address and Water Distribution can use address information to dispatch leak detection crews for faster and more focused leak detection.

Implementation of Water Meters

Where are we?

Currently, the City of Cornwall has in place:

- 16,600 residential water accounts with flat rate billing.
- 1,880 residential water meters with flat rate billing (installed but used only for volume information by municipal staff).
- 311 IC&I water meters with volume billing.
- 900 IC&I water meters with flat rate billing (installed but used only for volume information by municipal staff).





What is needed?

- 18,500 residential water meters in single and multi-residential locations
- Upgrade 1,034 IC&I meters

Costs

Installed cost for a water meter is estimated at \$650. Although, this figure could change depending on the procurement and installation plans.

For single residential and multi-residential units, the capital cost of installation would be approximately \$12,000,000. Installations would be completed over 2-3 years.

The upgrade of meters within the IC&I sector would cost approximately \$500,000.

Recommendation

There is a variety of approaches that the City could consider for a comprehensive metering plan. The recommendation is that the Environmental Services Department develop a Water Conservation and Servicing Master Plan for presentation to Council.

The master plan would include but not limited to:

- ➢ A public outreach program:
 - with an education component that provides a framework and vision for the water and wastewater servicing needs within the urban areas and recommend through stakeholder engagement what incentive programs would be best developed for the City's variety of customers (residential and IC&I).
- Community outreach is a fundamental first step for increasing awareness and gaining public support for water demand management. Community outreach also plays a fundamental role in enhancing the planning and implementation success for most Water Demand Management (WDM) initiatives. In other words, community outreach is a cross-cutting and ongoing WDM initiative. The community outreach would become part of the annual conservation program..
 - > Provide extensive consultation with the public and stakeholders.
 - > Develop a volume based rate structure.
 - Determine a financing model.
 - Develop a timeline.
 - Develop an implementation plan.
 - Business Plans.
 - ➢ Installation Plan
 - > Procurement methodology ie. Request for Proposals, tender development.
 - Conservation Incentive and Rebate Plan.





Appendix A: City of Guelph Conservation an example of Best Practice program

Blue Built Home program (City of Guelph)

To get a Blue Built Home certification, a homeowner must complete one of the following actions:

- Install a greywater reuse system
- Install an all-season rainwater harvesting system
- Complete a minimum of three qualifying water-saving options including installing an Energy Star® washing machine, Energy Star® dishwasher, WaterSense® showerheads, or sub-water meter.
 - Toilets with 1.0 gallons per flush or less will be rebated \$100.
 - An additional \$50 incentive will be provided for water customers that use septic systems and apply for a toilet rebate.
 - Smart irrigation timers will be rebated at \$75.
 - Rainwater harvesting cisterns will be rebated at \$0.50/gallon of storage.
 - A passive rainwater harvesting system rebate will be available at \$3/square foot of the drainage footprint. (Please see www.prescottwater.com for further details.)
 - Turf removal will increase from \$0.25/square foot of turf removed to \$0.50/square foot of turf removed.
 - Washing machines will be rebated at \$200 please see the website for qualifying washing machines and take a photo of your old machine.

In Cornwall we have the luxury of an almost infinite supply of water from the St Lawrence River and a WTP that exceeds the required capacity and is cost effective. On the other hand, the WWTP was recently upgraded to Secondary Treatment, but can not cope with the sewage volume during storm and snow melt events. The WWTP is also much more expensive to operate. Cost savings to taxpayers and minimization of direct discharges to the river come from the reduction in volume treated by the WWTP. This can be accomplished by two means: a) reduction in the volume of water leaking from a leaky water distribution system directly underground into the sewers that close by under the same streets, b) repair of the sewage collection system to prevent the ingress of storm water (combined sanitary and storm sewers, leaking sanitary sewer manhole covers, weeping tiles connected to the sanitary sewer, etc.). Installation of water meters allows the city to know how much treated water is delivered to the users. If it is significantly less that the total produced by the WTP, the source of the loss must be identified and corrected. This will reduce the operating cost of the WTP and the number of direct discharges significantly. Storm events and lawn watering complicate the process. But they can be dealt with. Installation of an every household meter (\$300-500), meter reading (in this modern age done remotely) and billing (city already has a system) is costly and should be debentured over a period of years. Purpose

To obtain direction with respect to the Mayor's compensation for this term of Council.

Recommendation

That Council adopt an increase for the Mayor's annual salary at the annual rate of inflation as defined by the Consumer Price Index (CPI) by Statistics Canada, and proceed with a bylaw for adoption at the next regular Council meeting.

Financial Implications

The current salary for the Mayor is \$53,941. Included in the 2019 Budget is a cost of living increase of 2% for Council compensation. The salary for the Mayor is budgeted at \$55,020. The annual salary beginning January 1, 2019 would be based on the remuneration received by the Mayor plus an increase based on CPI for the current term of Council, as follows:

The annual cost of living increase would be calculated based on the Dec to Dec CPI percentage change posted on the Statistics Canada website.

Beginning January 1, 2019, the Mayor's compensation shall also include the following Benefit and Pension provisions:

- 1. Compensation for Pension Benefit as per the established payment rate under the Ontario Municipal Employees Retirement Plan paid out for the purchase of RRSPs.
- 2. Benefits shall be paid for Dental, LTD and Life Insurance.
- 3. Monthly Car Allowance shall be established at \$160.00 per month.
- 4. Annual Compensation as a Member of the Cornwall Police Services Board would continue in accordance to the established remuneration.

Strategic Priority Implications

This report addresses Council's accountability and transparency to the ratepayers of the City of Cornwall.

Background / Discussion

Pursuant to the Municipal Act, municipal Councils have a legal obligation to conduct a review of its compensation at least once every four years. Traditionally, previous Councils have conducted this review during its final year of its term.

At its meeting of August 12, 2019, Council approved an annual increase to the salaries received by Councillors for the current term of Council. The Mayor's annual salary has not yet been decided.

In 2018, the Association of Clerks and Treasurers of Ontario (AMCTO) completed a report titled Municipal Council Compensation in Ontario. The goal of the report was to provide a better understanding of how municipalities compensate their councils, create a resource for municipalities who are reviewing their council remuneration packages, and to add to the body of research about how local politicians are paid. The findings of the report are based on 2017 data from 257 municipalities.



The following charts are excerpts from the AMCTO report. The charts outline the average Head of Council salary by population size and region (Table 1) and the percentage by population size (Table 2).

Purpose

To provide information to Council regarding the Ministry of Transportation (MTO) Connecting Links Program Intake for 2020-21 and to recommend a project submission.

Recommendation

That Council approve the following:

- a) That Council endorse a submission of an application to the 2020-21 MTO Connecting Links Program; and
- b) That the project submitted for the funding program shall be the Brookdale Avenue North Road Rehabilitation and Widening from the north limits of the Canadian National Railway (CNR) Overpass to the south limits of the Highway 401 Overpass.



Financial Implications

Through the 2020-21 Connecting Links Program, the MTO will provide funding of up to 90%, to a maximum of \$3 million, of eligible capital costs for approved projects.

The estimated cost to rehabilitate and widen Brookdale Avenue North from the north limits of the CNR Overpass to the south limits of the Highway 401 Overpass is \$1,850,000. Through the Connecting Links Program, the City may receive funding of up to \$1,665,000 (90%). The remaining \$185,000 (10%) would be funded from the 2020 and 2021 Asphalt Resurfacing Budget.

Strategic Priority Implications

This project includes the rehabilitation and the widening of an existing transportation network, which addresses Economic Development and Pursuing Diverse Population Growth of 50,000: (4) Continue to Invest in Infrastructure and (5) Encourage Infill Project (Brookdale).

Background / Discussion

Through the MTO Connecting Links Program, the Province of Ontario is investing \$30 million in 2020-21 for the construction and repair of roads and bridges for Connecting Links. Connecting links are municipal roads designated under the Public Transportation and Highway Improvement Act that connect two ends of a provincial highway through a municipality or to an international crossing or interprovincial border crossing. The objectives of the program are to make investments that:

- Address critical connecting link improvement needs;
- Extend the life of the asset;
- Are cost effective and appropriate to address connecting link needs; and
- Ensure the safe and efficient movement of provincial traffic.

The MTO will provide funding of up to 90 percent to a maximum of \$3 million, of eligible capital costs for approved projects.

There are 77 municipalities with designated connecting links eligible to apply to the MTO's Connecting Links Program. Cornwall is one of those municipalities as Highway No. 138 (Brookdale Avenue) connects from Cornwall Centre Road to the International Bridge access at Water Street.



In 2016, the City was successful in securing funding through Intake 1 of the Connecting Links Program for the Brookdale Avenue at CNR Overpass Rehabilitation.

For the 2020-21 MTO Connecting Links Program, Administration is recommending that the project submitted for the funding application shall be the Brookdale Avenue North Road Rehabilitation and Widening from the north limits of the CNR Overpass to the south limits of the Highway 401 Overpass. Please refer to the attached sketches of the project location. The proposed project would involve the following:

- 1) the rehabilitation of the road sub-base;
- 2) the widening of the roadway to accommodate cycling lanes on both sides;
- the asphalt resurfacing of the roadway to arterial road standards (3 lifts of asphalt); and
- 4) the re-grading of the shoulders and roadside ditches.

The estimated cost of the project is \$1,850,000. Through the Connecting Links Program, the City may receive funding of up to \$1,665,000 (90%). The remaining \$185,000 (10%) would be funded from the 2020 and 2021 Asphalt Resurfacing Budget.

The City previously applied for Connecting Links funding for the Brookdale Avenue North Road Rehabilitation and Widening project through the 2019-20 Intake; however, the funding application was not successful. Although the project was not successful for the 2019-20 Intake, the MTO strongly encouraged the City to re-apply for the same project under the 2020-21 Intake as it was deemed a high priority as part of the application review process. The 2020-21 Intake has \$30 million of funding available compared to the 2019-20 Intake which had \$15 million.

The funding application stipulates that a By-law be submitted with the application declaring that:

- The submitted application meets the requirements of the Ministry of Transportation's Connecting Links Program as described in the Program Guide;
- The municipality has a comprehensive asset management plan that includes all of the information and analysis described in Building Together: Guide for Municipal Asset Management Plans in place;



- The municipality will comply with the conditions that apply to the designated connecting links under the Highway Traffic Act to ensure the safe and efficient movement of provincial traffic; and
- The information in the application is factually accurate.

The associated By-law authorizing the submission of a funding application to the 2020-21 MTO Connecting Links Program has been included in the November 12th Agenda. If Council does not endorse the funding application, the By-law can be removed from the Agenda.

If the City is successful in receiving funding through the program, the Mayor and Clerk must be authorized to execute and sign the associated documents and agreements.



Ministry of Transportation (MTO) Connecting Links Program 2020-21

Guide

August 2019

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Section 1 – Purpose

The Ministry of Transportation's **Connecting Links Program** provides dedicated provincial funding for road and bridge projects on designated connecting link highways.

The Connecting Links Program has been re-designed to provide a sound basis to make provincial funding decisions and ensure that provincial financial accountability and asset management requirements are met. Through a structured application process all applicants are considered in a consistent and transparent manner.

This Program Guide has been prepared to assist connecting link municipalities in completing and submitting the application. The guide includes legislation that applies to connecting links, a detailed description of the scope of work eligible for funding and the requirements for detailed information on connecting link condition and improvement needs.

Applicants are encouraged to contact their local regional office to ask any questions before submitting an application.

The ministry will review all submissions and will notify successful and unsuccessful applicants after funding decisions are made in early 2020.

Funding decisions will be based on an assessment of connecting link needs, the ministry's prioritization of submitted projects and the available budget in any year.

Section 2 – Objectives

The objectives of the program are to make connecting link investments that:

- · Address critical connecting link improvement needs;
- Extend the life of the asset;
- Are cost effective and appropriate to address the connecting link need; and
- · Ensure the safe and efficient movement of provincial traffic.

The ministry will prioritize projects that best meet these objectives and focus on addressing critical and urgent connecting link needs first. The Connecting Links Program requires that municipalities submit detailed information on all connecting link road section and structures. This will enable the ministry to assess the current and future state of connecting link infrastructure and determine how to best target connecting link investments on a multi-year basis.

Section 3 – Connecting Links Policy

Connecting links are municipal roads that connect two ends of a provincial highway through a community or to an international or interprovincial border crossing. These are critical roadways that serve provincial and municipal interests, as they carry long-distance provincial highway traffic moving through communities, as well as local traffic within the community.

Connecting links are formally designated under section 21 of the *Public Transportation and Highway Improvement Act*, R.S.O. 1990, c. P. 50 as amended. Under the Act, a connecting link remains a "highway" under the jurisdiction and control of the municipality.

Connecting links are typically under the ownership of a lower tier municipality or a single tier municipality. Where a connecting link intersects with an upper tier highway, the intersection remains under the jurisdiction and control of the upper tier municipality. These intersections are eligible for funding under the Connecting Links Program.

The Connecting Links Program provides funding for eligible capital improvement costs – not maintenance. The responsibility for maintenance of connecting links lies with the municipality. Under section 44 of the *Municipal Act*, R.S.O. 2001, the municipality that has jurisdiction over a highway or bridge must keep it in a reasonable state of repair.

Ontario has set out Minimum Maintenance Standards for municipal highways, including connecting links, under the *Municipal Act*. Ontario Regulation 239/02 provides municipalities with guidelines for maintaining municipal highways including winter maintenance, roadway and sidewalk surface condition, traffic control signal systems, regulatory and warning signs, etc.

Ontario Regulation 104/97 of the *Public Transportation and Highway Improvement Act* requires that municipalities visually inspect bridge structures with a span of greater than or equal to three metres (in the direction of traffic) at least once every two years by, or under the direction, of a professional engineer. To be eligible for the Connecting Links Program, municipalities will be required to submit a Municipal Structure Inspection report to MTO every two years for each connecting link bridge and culvert three metres or greater in length (in direction of traffic) as they are completed.

The ministry has the authority under the *Bridges Act* 1990, c. B.12, to approve connecting link bridge projects. MTO will review structure inspections on an ongoing basis and assess proposed structure projects to ensure that critical structure needs on connecting links are addressed.

Under the *Highway Traffic Act*, R.S.O. 1990, c. H.8, the ministry has the authority to approve all municipal by-laws and traffic control signals that restrict or interrupt the flow of through traffic on the connecting link highway including, but not restricted to:

- Limiting weight on bridges;
- Erection of traffic controls and pedestrian signal systems; and
- Regulating motor vehicle traffic on connecting links.

Appendix 1 includes sections of legislation that applies to connecting links. Municipalities should consult with the ministry to ensure that necessary approvals will be in place prior to connecting link funding being granted.

Section 4 – Program Overview

Which municipalities are eligible?

The Ministry of Transportation's Connecting Links Program provides dedicated provincial funding for road and bridge projects on connecting link highways designated under the Public *Transportation and Highway Improvement Act*.

All 77 Ontario municipalities with designated connecting links are eligible for funding. Eligible municipalities and designated connecting link road sections are listed in **Appendix 2**.

A municipality with one designated link is permitted to submit one project per year. A municipality that has more than one designated connecting link may submit a maximum of two projects per year. If submitting for two projects however, each application must be for a project located on separate connecting link sections as identified in Appendix 2. No more than one application per connecting link section is permitted by a municipality.

What amount of funding can be requested?

Connecting links serve both provincial and local traffic needs; therefore, a provincial-municipal cost sharing partnership is considered appropriate.

The ministry will provide funding for up to 90% of total eligible project costs. The maximum amount of funding for eligible costs is \$3 million per project. Project proposals should include a detailed scope of work and cost estimates.

The applicant is required to contribute the remaining 10% of eligible project costs and pay for all ineligible project costs. The municipality cannot use capital funding from any other capital application program (i.e. Investing in Canada Infrastructure Program (ICIP)) for the same road or bridge project funded under the Connecting Links Program.

Despite the foregoing, general formula based or other non-application based funding revenue received from other provincial or federal sources may be used towards a municipality's 10% contribution.

When would funding be provided?

Once funding decisions are made, the ministry will notify successful applicants that their project has been approved for funding. Municipalities may then begin the tendering process and incur project costs starting April 1, 2020. The ministry will provide a Contribution Agreement following the Minister letter.

The execution of the Agreement is required before payments can be made. Payments will be made on a milestone basis (refer to Section 8).

Section 5 – Project Eligibility

What are eligible connecting links projects?

The Connecting Links Program provides funding for the design, construction, renewal, rehabilitation and replacement of connecting link infrastructure. Maintenance costs, including winter maintenance, are not eligible for funding.

A municipality may submit for detailed design and construction as one project; or alternatively, a municipality may submit detailed design for funding as a separate project prior to construction. In the case of the latter, however, the ministry cannot guarantee funding for the construction project in the subsequent year. Funding for the construction would be considered along with other projects submitted in the following year.

Expansion projects (road widening) resulting from general traffic growth (provincial and municipal), will be considered eligible projects. However, the costs for improvements directly related to increased traffic from new development or major expansion of an existing development continue to be the responsibility of the municipality (and/or the developer).

As noted below, land acquisition and the cost of municipal infrastructure within the connecting link right-of-way are not eligible for funding under the Connecting Links Program, such as watermains, sanitary sewers, utilities, etc.

The proposal must not include multiple projects, e.g., projects on separate roads or structures that are not connected. Proposals can include various related works such as road reconstruction and storm sewer repair; road and intersection improvements; multiple spans on one structure; and, structure replacement and approach road improvements like guiderail.

NOTE: The same connecting link <u>road or bridge</u> project cannot be submitted under both the Connecting Links Program and another capital application program such as ICIP. A municipality may, however, submit an application for <u>water or wastewater</u> work on a connecting link under another funding program. If the same <u>road or bridge</u> project is submitted under multiple capital application programs, it will become ineligible for funding under the Connecting Links program.

Projects already underway or awarded at the time of the application period will be deemed ineligible for the program.

What project costs are eligible/ineligible for reimbursement?

Funds can be used for:

- Environmental Assessment costs
- · Design/Engineering costs
- Project Management/Contract Administration costs
- Materials
- Construction

Funds cannot be used for:

- · Costs incurred before project approval or after committed project completion date
- · Land acquisition
- · Leasing land, equipment, buildings and other facilities
- Financing charges
- Legal fees

Appendix 3 outlines the scope of eligible work for connecting link projects with more specific requirements detailed in Annexes A-G of **Appendix 4**. MTO encourages municipalities to consider sustainable construction practices for connecting link projects as described in **Appendix 5**.

The connecting link right-of-way typically includes some municipal infrastructure that is not eligible for funding under the Connecting Links Program, such as watermains, sanitary sewers, utilities, etc. The municipality is responsible for costs related to these assets and all other ineligible items.

Municipalities should consult with MTO regional offices (listed in Section 10) to seek clarification on eligible project costs before submitting an application.

What are the eligible project net costs?

The application form requires that the applicant indicate the eligible project net costs, which is the eligible project costs under the Connecting Links Program, *excluding the HST rebate that the municipality expects to receive.* The maximum provincial funding contribution will be 90% of the net eligible costs up to a maximum of \$3 million. It is the applicant's responsibility to determine the HST rebate.

Section 6 – Application Submission

The Connecting Links Program has a one-stage application process, where eligible connecting link municipalities are requested to submit specific project information through a standard application form along with supporting documents.

Where can I obtain an application?

When are applications due?

Applications are due by Friday, November 22, 2019 at 5 p.m. EST.

How are applications submitted?

Applications will be accepted electronically or through regular mail. Municipalities are encouraged to submit electronically. Applicants should retain a copy of the application and other submitted materials. An email response will be provided indicating that the submission has been received.

If submitting by email, the completed application should be sent along with all required attachments (declaration, asset management tables, bridge inspections, project proposal and any supporting documents) to the program email address: <u>CLProgram@ontario.ca</u>.

If submitting by mail or courier, the application package must be sent to the Ministry of Transportation at the address indicated in section 10.

Section 7 – Project Application

Municipalities are required to complete a project application form to be eligible for connecting link funding. This will provide a consistent basis for the ministry to assess the proposed project and the municipality's multi-year connecting link needs.

In addition to the application form, municipalities must submit a council resolution (template attached to the form) that:

- a) demonstrates council's support of the project identified in application;
- b) confirms that capital funding is available for the municipal contribution component;
- c) indicates that if the application is successful, that the municipality will proceed with the project in accordance with the timelines specified in the application.

What are the Application Asset Management Plan requirements?

There are four asset management planning requirements for connecting link municipalities.

1. Asset Management Plan

Municipalities applying for connecting link funding must have a recently completed and publically posted asset management plan indicating the asset condition, capital and maintenance needs, investment priorities and financial strategy for all core infrastructure which includes road, bridge, water and wastewater assets.

If the applicant has previously provided a municipal asset management and there are no updates, there is no need to resubmit the same asset management plan. If the applicant has updated the plan or if it's the first time applying to the Connecting Links Program, the applicant is required to provide access to the plan.

2. Connecting Link Structure Inspection

Municipalities are required to submit a Municipal Structure Inspection Manual (OSIM) or equivalent inspection report every other year for each connecting link bridge and large culvert three metres or greater in length (in the direction of traffic).

If the applicant has previously submitted all current Municipal Structure Inspection Forms, there is no need to resubmit the inspection forms. However, if there are updated inspections they should be submitted. If it's the first time applying to the Connecting Links Program, the applicant is required to provide inspection forms for all connecting link structures.

3. Connecting Link Asset Inventory, Conditions and Needs

Municipalities are required to submit detailed asset data on all connecting link road sections and structures (three metres or greater in length in the direction of traffic) under its jurisdiction. A map must be provided showing all connecting link road sections and structures. The map must indicate connecting link street and intersecting street names and other landmark references.

If the applicant has submitted all structure and road data within the last two-years, this information does not need to be resubmitted. However, where the information has been updated, it should be submitted. If it's the first time applying to the Connecting Links Program, the applicant is required to provide this information for all connecting link road sections and structures.

Appendix 6 includes the specific connecting link road section and structure data that must be submitted. The applicant shall submit this information in Excel or equivalent data file(s) that the ministry can import into Excel.

4. Connecting Link Maintenance Plan/Strategy

Applicants are required to indicate that there is an ongoing maintenance plan or strategy for connecting links. Effective maintenance of connecting link roadway and structures is critical to prevent premature deterioration of the asset and defer the need for costly rehabilitation or reconstruction. Examples include routing and sealing of cracks to prevent water entering the pavement structure and washing bridge expansion joints on a routine basis.

Applicants are also required to indicate that there is an ongoing inspection program to assess road sections and structures using sound condition ratings such as a Pavement Condition Index or Bridge Condition Index. Applicants should describe their methodology. All applicants are required to submit this information.

What are the requirements for Aboriginal Community Consultation?

Municipalities should inform and consult as necessary with stakeholders including Aboriginal communities as part of the environmental assessment process.

The Governments of Canada and Ontario, along with municipalities have a duty to consult with Aboriginal communities where a decision or action may adversely impact asserted or established Aboriginal or treaty rights. Aboriginal communities include Indian, Inuit and Métis people of Canada and any other group having Aboriginal or treaty rights under section 35 of the *Constitution Act*, 1982.

The day-to-day procedural aspects of consultation may be delegated to the municipality who may have their own obligations to consult with Aboriginal communities and other stakeholders. Where this consultation is required, the applicant should appropriately plan and budget for this work as part of the project costs.

To assist MTO in determining the province's duty to consult obligations, the application requires municipalities to indicate whether they have consulted with Aboriginal communities or aware of any concerns with respect to historical or archaeological finds claims or assertions by Aboriginal communities in connection with the proposed project site. MTO will advise funded municipalities if there are provincial duty to consult obligations that need to be considered.

How will applications be assessed?

Projects will be assessed on the basis of:

- Project criticality based on connecting link deficiencies and/or renewal needs;
- Project urgency based on stated 10-year deficiencies and risk assessment;
- Cost-effective and appropriate project to address stated connecting link need;
- Appropriate project activities and costs under the Connecting Links Program;
- Supporting documentation: asset management plan, bridge inspection reports, detailed project proposal, engineering studies/plans, etc.; and,
- · Potential coordination with adjacent, concurrent provincial highway project.

MTO will prioritize projects that best meet the objectives of the Connecting Links Program, addressing critical and urgent connecting link needs first.

Funding decisions will take into consideration the ministry's prioritization of the projects, regional connecting link needs and the available budget in any year.

Will a municipality be notified if its application is unsuccessful?

Yes, both successful and unsuccessful applicants will be notified by the Ministry of Transportation after funding decisions are made. Unsuccessful municipalities are encouraged to contact their regional MTO representatives for feedback regarding their unsuccessful projects.

Section 8 – Contribution Agreement

The Contribution Agreement is a legal agreement that outlines the rights, responsibilities and obligations of the province and the municipality and includes various Schedules, e.g., project costs, milestones/timelines, reporting requirements, etc.

MTO will notify successful applicants by Minister letter that their project has been approved for funding. Municipalities may then begin the tendering process and incur project costs starting April 1, 2020. The ministry will provide the Contribution Agreement following the Minister letter. The execution of the Agreement is required before payments can be made.

The signatures of the Head of Council and the Minister of Transportation (or his delegate) are necessary to execute the agreement. Municipalities are encouraged to obtain Head of Council signature and a council resolution as soon as possible. Three (3) copies of the signed agreement are to be couriered to the MTO Program Coordinator. Once co-signed by the Minister, the Program Coordinator will provide a copy to the municipality and MTO's regional office.

How will the provincial funding flow?

Funding will be provided for eligible project costs on a milestone payment approach:

- Contract Award 50%
- Substantial Completion 35%
- Final Report 15%

In order to be paid at these milestones it is critical that the project be completed on the submitted schedule. In the Application Form, the applicant is required to indicate the fiscal year of completion and any timeline risks, how the long the delay could be and provide mitigation strategies. Schedule risks include the time required for tendering, delays due to regulatory approvals or third party agreements, utility relocates, inclement weather, etc. If the schedule risks are significant, consideration should be given to extending the project completion over two or three years. The ministry will approve the multi-year funding on this basis.

Funded municipalities will be required to state their anticipated dates for Contract, Substantial Completion and Final Report. These milestones must be achieved by specific timelines as follows:

Milestone 1: Award of First Contract	By June 30, 2020
Milestone 2: Substantial Completion	By December 31 of Fiscal Year of Completion
Milestone 3: Final Report	By March 8 of Fiscal Year of Completion

Milestone payments will be disbursed once the ministry has accepted the Milestone Report. The first payment will be made once the contribution agreement has been signed by both parties (spring/summer of 2020) and Milestone 1 has been submitted to MTO for review. The Substantial Completion and Final Report payments will be made on the basis of the actual incurred costs up to the approved funding amount. Cost overruns are not eligible for funding. Any unused funding must be returned to the Government of Ontario.

The Milestone 1 Report must include statement of the detailed project costs based on the contract award and report on revised budget if different from the application budget. The ministry will disburse payments based on the eligible contract award costs – not the submitted estimated projects costs.

The Progress Reports must include information on eligible costs incurred to date, remaining eligible costs to be incurred, construction milestones completed, any anticipated variances (e.g., project scope, budget or schedule) and verification of the expected completion date.

The Milestone 2 Report must include a Declaration of Substantial Completion attested to by a municipal official, e.g., Clerk or Chief Finance Officer.

The Final Report requires confirmation of project completion, statement of incurred costs supported by the submission of invoices and any variances such as project scope, budget, or schedule, etc., from the Contribution Agreement must be noted and certified by a municipal official. In addition, in the Final Report, the municipality must indicate the benefits of the connecting link improvement such as safety, extended service life, pavement condition, structures in good condition, etc. as well as any economic or other benefits of the project for the community.

Templates for a Revised Budget Report, Progress Report, Declaration of Substantial Completion, Final Report and a chart for monthly invoice tracking will be provided as Schedules in the Contribution Agreement.

Applicants must advise the ministry, in writing or email and certified by a municipal official, of any proposed variation from the approved project scope of work, costs, completion date, etc., before implementation.

Public Transportation and Highway Improvement Act R.S.O. 1990, CHAPTER P.50

Connecting links, extensions

21. (1) The Minister may designate a highway or part of a highway as a **connecting link** between parts of the King's Highway or as an extension of the King's Highway, to be constructed and maintained by the road authority having jurisdiction over the highway or part of the highway. 1996, c. 1, Sched. M, s. 49.

Jurisdiction and control unchanged

(2) A highway or part of a highway does not, by reason of its having been designated under subsection (1), become the property of the Crown, but every such highway or part of a highway remains under the jurisdiction and control of the road authority. 1996, c. 1, Sched. M, s. 49.

Highway Traffic Act R.S.O. 1990, CHAPTER H.8

Regulations limiting weight on bridges

123. (1) The Minister may make regulations limiting the gross vehicle weight of any vehicle or any class thereof passing over a bridge forming part of the King's Highway or a highway in territory without municipal organization and notice of the limit of the weights fixed by the regulation, legibly printed, shall be posted up in a conspicuous place at each end of the bridge. R.S.O. 1990, c. H.8, s. 123 (1).

By-laws limiting weight on bridges

(2) The municipality or other authority having jurisdiction over a bridge may by by-law limit the gross vehicle weight of any vehicle or any class thereof passing over the bridge, and the requirements of subsection (1) with respect to the posting up of notice apply thereto. R.S.O. 1990, c. H.8, s. 123 (2); 1996, c. 33, s. 13 (1); 2002, c. 17, Sched. F, Table.

Same, on connecting links

(3) Despite subsection (2), where the bridge forms part of a highway designated as a **connecting link** under subsection 21 (1) of the *Public Transportation and Highway Improvement Act*, the by-law shall not become operative until it is approved by the Ministry. 1996, c. 33, s. 13 (2).

Regulations

(4) The Minister may make regulations establishing standards to determine allowable gross vehicle weight for any vehicle or class of vehicle for the purpose of subsection (2). 1996, c. 33, s. 13 (2).

Traffic control signals and pedestrian control signals

144. (1) ...

Erection of traffic control signals and signal systems

(31) Subject to subsection (31.1), no traffic control signal system or traffic control signal used in conjunction with a traffic control signal system shall be erected or installed except in accordance with an approval obtained from a person designated to give such approvals by the municipality or other authority that has jurisdiction over the highway or the intersection. 1996, c. 33, s. 14.

Same, on connecting links

(31.1) No traffic control signal system or traffic control signal used in conjunction with a traffic control signal system shall be erected or installed on a highway designated as a **connecting link** under subsection 21 (1) of the *Public Transportation and Highway Improvement Act* except in accordance with an approval obtained from the Minister or an official of the Ministry authorized by the Minister to grant such approval. 1996, c. 33, s. 14.

Effect of by-laws

Inconsistent by-laws deemed repealed

195. (1) If a provision of a municipal by-law passed by the council of a municipality or a police services board for, (a)regulating traffic on the highways;

(b) regulating traffic on the highways;

(c) prohibiting or regulating the operation of motor vehicles or any type or class thereof on the highways, is inconsistent with this Act or the regulations, the provision of the by-law shall be deemed to be repealed upon the inconsistency arising. Approval of traffic by-laws for connecting links

(3) If the council of a municipality passes a by-law for a purpose mentioned in clause (1) (a) or (c) that affects traffic on a highway designated as a **connecting link** under subsection 21 (1) of the *Public Transportation and Highway Improvement Act*, the clerk of the municipality shall file a copy of the by-law with the Ministry within 30 days of its passing, and the by-law shall not become operative until it is approved by the Ministry. 1996, c. 33, s. 15 (2).

Approval of traffic by-law in whole or in part

(4) Any by-law for regulating traffic on highways that is submitted to the Ministry for approval may be approved in whole or in part and, where part of a by-law is approved only, that part shall become operative. R.S.O. 1990, c. H.8, s. 195 (4).

Withdrawal of approval by Ministry

(5) The Ministry may withdraw its approval to any by-law or any part thereof by notice sent by registered mail to the clerk of the municipality and the by-law or part thereof shall be deemed to be repealed twenty-one days after the sending of the notice. R.S.O. 1990, c. H.8, s. 195 (5).

Bridges Act R.S.O. 1990, CHAPTER B.12

Approval of Minister

(1) No person, except a municipal corporation or other authority having jurisdiction over highways, shall build, place, construct, rebuild, replace or alter a bridge or other structure over or across any river or stream or part thereof, except with the approval of the Minister of Transportation. 1996, c. 33, s. 18.

Same

(1.1) A person who builds, places, constructs, rebuilds, replaces or alters a bridge, culvert or causeway in accordance with a work permit or an instrument granted under the *Public Lands Act* or an approval under the *Lakes and Rivers Improvement Act* is not required to obtain an approval under subsection (1). 2006, c. 19, Sched. T, s. 1.

Same

(2) A municipality or other authority having jurisdiction over highways shall not build, place, construct, rebuild, replace or alter any bridge or other structure that forms, or will upon completion form, part of a highway that has been designated as a **connecting link** under subsection 21 (1) of the *Public Transportation and Highway Improvement Act*, except with the approval of the Minister of Transportation. 1996, c. 33, s. 18.

Conditions of approval

- (3) The Minister of Transportation may give his or her approval under subsection (1) upon receiving,
 - (a)proof that the plan of the proposed bridge or structure or alterations and a surveyor's description of the site or proposed site have been deposited in the proper land registry office;
 - (b) proof that notice of the application has been published for three successive weeks in *The Ontario Gazette* and in two newspapers having a general circulation in the locality where the site or proposed site of the bridge or structure is located; and
 - (c) such other information or documentation as the Minister may require. 1996, c. 33, s. 18.

Same

(4) The Minister of Transportation may give his or her approval under subsection (2) upon receiving such information or documentation as he or she may require. 1996, c. 33, s. 18.

Appendix 4 – Scope of Eligible Work – Annexes

Annex A: Appliances and Works

Where construction or improvement of a connecting link makes it necessary to alter or relocate appliances and works of an operating corporation, the cost that may be eligible for cost sharing under the terms of an applicable agreement is to be established based on the group to which the appliances and works belong.

Group 1

Group 1 relates to appliances and works as defined under *The Public Service Works on Highways Act*, R.S.O. 1990, c.49 s.1, i.e., poles, wires, conduits, transformers, pipes, pipe lines or any other works, structures or appliances except water mains and sewers under **Group 3** placed on or under a highway by an operating corporation. An operating corporation being defined, under the above noted statute, as a municipal corporation or commission or a company or an individual operating or using a telephone or telegraph service, or transmitting, distributing or supplying electricity or artificial or natural gas for light, heat or power.

Group 2

Group 2 relates to appliances and works as defined under *The Public Service Works on Highways Act*, R.S.O. 1990, c.49 s.1, i.e., poles, wires, conduits, transformers, pipes, pipe lines or any other works, structures or appliances except water mains and sewers under **Group 3** placed on or under a highway by Ontario Hydro, Bell Telephone Company, gas pipeline companies operating under Federal Charter.

Group 3

Group 3 relates to watermains and sanitary sewers placed on or under a highway other than storm sewers (see Annex D) and operated by the municipality, municipal corporation, or commission or company or individual.

Annex B: Traffic Control Devices

The installation and improvement costs, on connecting links, of warranted traffic control signals and other approved traffic control devices, as detailed in the Ontario Traffic Manual (OTM), may be eligible for funding.

Traffic Control Signals

- 1. To qualify for funding all traffic control signal installations must comply with the OTM Book 12 and meet the warrants contained in section 4 of the manual;
- 2. The traffic control signals must also conform to the requirements of the *Highway Traffic Act*, R.S.O. 1990, Chapter H.8, and more specifically Regulation 626;
- 3. The installation should meet the technical requirements of the ministry as detailed in the Ontario Provincial Standards and Specifications;
- 4. Ministry approval of the traffic signal design required for all traffic control signals located on a highway designated as a connecting link as required under section 144(31.1) of the *Highway Traffic Act*;
- 5. The modernization of traffic control signals that were not eligible upon installation may be approved for funding by the ministry if the conditions set out under the requirements in 1. to 3. above, are met;
- 6. The installation of traffic control signals, as part of the construction or reconstruction of an entrance or within five years thereafter, is not eligible for funding even when the warrants are met. It is assumed the municipality will recover the cost of the installation of such traffic control signals from the owner or developer served by the entrance;
- 7. The installation of warranted traffic control signals at an existing entrance, more than five years after the construction or reconstruction of the entrance, is eligible for funding provided all other criteria are met;
- 8. The municipality agrees to maintain such other traffic controls (e.g., parking restrictions) as may, in the opinion of the ministry, be necessary to ensure the efficient operation of traffic signals and will confirm this in writing;
- 9. A portion of the capital costs associated with a computerized traffic management system may be eligible for funding. The needs of a traffic management system as it relates to the connecting link will dictate the amount of funding. The municipality needs to justify its request to the ministry. The ministry will review each case and approve the funding, as applicable, based on merit; and
- 10. New or replacements for traffic control signals and the associated appurtenances must meet accessibility standards as defined in Ontario Regulation 191/11 of the Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act.

Other Traffic Control Devices that may be eligible for funding include:

- 1. All traffic signs defined in Books 5 and 6 of the OTM, including the French translation;
- 2. Illuminated signs provided that they are eligible under Books 5 and 6 of the OTM and conform to the standard sign, shape and colour;
- 3. All miscellaneous traffic devices defined in Book 12 of the OTM;
- 4. All pavement hazard and delineation markings defined in Book 11;
- 5. Overhead signs approved by the ministry; and
- 6. All signs and markings defined in Regulation 615 of the *Highway Traffic Act*.

Note:

- Regulation 402/15 now applies to all signs and markings regarding pedestrian crossovers and pedestrian crossing devices for lower speed/lower volume roads.
- Guidelines for new pedestrian crossing treatment devices will be available in OTM Book 15.

Annex C: Illumination

The capital cost for the installation of illumination on connecting links at intersections may be eligible for funding under the following conditions:

- 1. The intersections have warranted traffic signals,
- 2. The intersections are unsignalized, fully channelized, and classified as rural intersections, or
- 3. The highway intersects an unprotected level railway crossing subject to National Transportation Agency Board Order.

A warrant for partial illumination is considered to exist for new municipal installations as follows:

- 1. Intersections in built-up areas (see *Highway Traffic Act*, R.S.O. 1990 c. H.8, for definition of "built-up" area) with raised medians on all approaches, separate right and left turn lanes, and 4 lanes or more on each approach;
- Intersections in rural areas ("rural area" is an area not classified as "built-up area") where warranted traffic signals exist, or two 4 lane undivided highways meet and warrants for traffic signals are at least 80% fulfilled, or traffic is channelized by one or more islands;
- Unprotected municipal highway/rail crossing where the National Railway Transportation Agency has authorized the installation of luminaries. The federal government share will be deducted from the total cost before calculating the funding;
- 4. Highway tunnels in built-up areas where the tunnel is more than 25 metres long;
- 5. Design levels for illumination, including materials types and luminaries selected, shall not exceed Ministry of Transportation illumination policy; and
- 6. Illumination necessitated by adjacent development and illumination at private or commercial entrances is the responsibility of the property owner. Funding is not applicable for the design, construction, or power for illuminating these areas.

Annex D: Drainage

The capital cost for the installation of storm sewers on connecting links may be eligible for funding as set out below.

- 1. Storm sewer must be an economical alternative to the maintenance of an open ditch with numerous entrance culverts;
- 2. Storm sewer must be necessary in order to increase the use of an existing right-of-way for roadway purposes;
- 3. Storm sewer must be necessary in order to increase the traffic carrying capacity of an existing roadway by allowing for parking off the travelled way;
- 4. The replacement of an existing storm sewer must be for reasons of deterioration or to increase the capacity if the existing storm sewer is less than 700 millimetres diameter;
- 5. Only the facilities required for the drainage associated with the highway are eligible for funding;
- 6. Where the diameter of a storm sewer to be installed is greater than 700 millimetres, only that portion of the cost that 700 millimetres bears to the diameter of a circle of equivalent area measured in millimetres of the storm sewer installed, may be eligible for funding;
- 7. Where an off-take storm sewer or open ditch to an appropriate outlet is required, it may be eligible for funding under the following conditions:
 - 7.1. Where the storm sewer pipe is greater than 700 millimetres, the criterion in 6. above applies; or
 - 7.2. Where an open ditch is used, the cost eligible for funding shall be based on the same percentage that was applied to the last section of storm sewer pipe leading to the open ditch.
- 8. Where an adequate existing storm sewer is altered to accommodate drainage that is not eligible, such alteration is not eligible for funding;
- 9. Where a storm sewer on a highway under the jurisdiction of the province is designed to accommodate both the provincial highway drainage needs and those of a connecting link eligible under the Connecting Links Program, only the lesser of the municipality's share of the cost of construction or that amount calculated as in 6. above may be eligible for funding;
- 10. Where the municipality constructs a storm sewer that is eligible for funding and provides additional capacity for the needs of another municipality that are also eligible for funding, only the amount calculated as in 6. above may be eligible for funding;
- 11. Sewer covers associated with storm sewer systems may be eligible for funding. Where the outlets from the sewer cover are greater than 700 millimetres in diameter, only that portion of the cost that 700 millimetres bears to the diameter of the outlet pipe in millimetres may be eligible for funding; and
- 12. Where a storm sewer is installed under the provisions of the Drainage Act, R.S.O. 1990, Chapter D.17, the assessment made against the municipality will be eligible for funding subject to the limitations in 11 above.

Annex E: Stormwater Management

The capital cost for the installation of stormwater detention facilities on connecting links may be eligible for funding as detailed below.

1. It will be the responsibility of the municipality to analyse and cost various drainage system alternatives and justify the final selection based on the most economical and environmentally responsible solution. At the request of the municipality, the ministry will provide guidance on the degree of detail required in submissions.

- 2. The maximum cost of a storm water management system, complete with detention components and/or combined sewer components, to be considered cannot exceed the total cost of a conventional system with continuous, separated, normal size pipes and/or ditches by more than 10% as detention facilities have greater environmental benefits than separated systems. The following provisions apply:
 - 2.1. The maximum cost of a stormwater management system is the unadjusted total cost to the municipality, not just the portion of total cost eligible for road funding;
 - 2.2. A subsystem of a larger system is acceptable for consideration; and
 - 2.3. In a combined sewer system, the cost of providing extra sewage treatment capacity to accommodate the extra flows will be included in the total cost for comparison purposes. However, this cost is not eligible for funding.
- 3. The eligible costs for funding of the stormwater detention system must be adjusted to pay for only that water associated with the connecting link highway.
- 4. For a stormwater detention facility to be considered for funding, the detention facility must be justified on the basis that a controlled release of water is necessary to prevent water damage downstream.
- 5. For ponds and retention tanks with pipe inlets, funding will be based on the "700 millimetres diameter rule" (refer to Annex D, section 6) applied to the inlet or the sum of the diameters of the inlets. If an oversized inlet is used the diameter of the first normal size upstream pipe is to be used.
- 6. The "700 millimetres diameter rule" will be applied to oversized pipes whose purpose is not detention.
- 7. Where funding is applicable for combined sewers, the capital cost is subject to the "700 millimetres diameter rule".
- 8. Inlet control of stormwater is accomplished by allowing stormwater to temporary pond upstream of catch basins or other outlets. The water slowly subsides as the storm passes. Inlet control, within the highway, is eligible for funding provided the maximum depth of water accumulation at the travelled edge of the roadway does not exceed 75 millimetres (designers use two year flood), and the ponded water does not present a safety or health hazard.

Annex F: Detailed Design/Engineering Studies

A municipality may submit for funding for detailed design/engineering as part of a proposed construction project. Alternatively, a municipality may submit for funding of detailed design/engineering as a separate project prior to construction. In the case of the latter, the ministry will not guarantee funding for the construction project in the subsequent year. Funding for the construction would be considered along with other projects submitted in the following year.

The ministry reserves the right to assess the components of the proposed detailed design and engineering to determine what scope of work is eligible for funding under the Connecting Links Program.

Applicants choosing to submit for funding of a separate detailed design/engineering study should:

- 1. Where applicable, include a copy of the preliminary design/engineering report for the proposed project completed by a professional engineer;
- 2. Include a copy of a proposal for detailed design and engineering, with quoted costs from a professional engineer;
- 3. Ensure road and bridge designs are undertaken according to the applicable municipal, provincial, federal, or other standards;
- 4. Include the appropriate scope of work for a detailed design/engineering study. Consideration for design elements may include, but are not limited to the following:
 - Site plans
 - Horizontal and vertical control data
 - Geometric design
 - Horizontal and vertical alignments
 - Pavement design, including life-cycle costing
 - Typical cross-sections
 - Design-cross-sections
 - Earth balance design
 - Grading
 - Drainage quality and quantity, and storm sewer design
 - Utilities locations and relocations, where applicable
 - Illumination

- Traffic control devices
- Electrical design
- Hydrotechnical design
- General arrangement drawings (structures)
- Foundation design
- Substructure design
- Superstructure design
- Barriers, railings, expansion joints, bearings, protection systems
- Traffic control plan, staging and detours
- Traffic signing and pavement markings
- PHM-125 approval
- Property requirements
- 5. Ensure that the detail design/engineering study will establish a comprehensive cost estimate to construct the project;
- 6. Develop a schedule detailing the timing for:
 - Issuing RFP for detail design/engineering study
 - Commencement of detail design/engineering study
 - Completion of detail design/engineering study
 - Proposed timing for construction

Annex G: Contract Administration

It is expected that contract administration tasks will be carried out during project construction to verify:

- a) The work that was done during construction of the project;
- b) The quality of work and materials used during construction of the project, and;
- c) How much it will cost to complete construction of the project.

The contract administrator may be the municipality or a consultant retained by the municipality. Consultant's fees for contract administration services are eligible for funding. If the municipality is acting as contract administrator, the maximum amount allowable for contract administration cannot exceed 10% of total net eligible project costs.

The contract administrator will be responsible to monitor and approve any changes to the scope and costs for construction of the project. The municipality is responsible for any increase in project costs resulting from changes in the work. When changes in the work would be eligible for funding, additional funding may be considered on a case by case basis at the discretion of the ministry. The municipality shall pay all costs not approved by the ministry and all unforeseen costs of the construction work.

Change in the work: means the deletion, extension, increase, decrease or alteration of lines, grades, dimensions, quantities, methods, drawings, changes in the character of the work to be done or the materials of the work or part thereof, within the intended scope of the contract.

Consideration for tasks and services required for contract administration should include, but are not limited to:

- Convene and attend a pre-construction meeting(s)
- Convene and attend construction progress meetings as scheduled
- · Prepare and distribute agendas and minutes for all meetings
- · Respond to contractor's questions, proposals, and requests for information;
- · Prepare and issue all work orders, field orders and change orders
- Prepare and certify monthly progress payment certificates
- Co-ordinate and schedule inspection and testing activities related to quality control/quality assurance for construction materials and work
- Communication of all field and laboratory test results (i.e., compaction) in a timely manner

Contract administration services tasks shall accommodate all aspects of the contract process through the Warranty Period and the Final Completion Certificate.

Appendix 5 – Sustainable Construction Practices

MTO encourages municipalities to consider innovation and the use of sustainable construction practices for connecting link projects.

MTO procurement practices allow the use of recycled and reclaimed materials up to the maximum limits imposed by engineering standards to ensure that such materials are not used inappropriately and do not compromise the longevity of pavements and structures.

If recycled and reclaimed materials are used appropriately, then cost savings can be achieved through conservation of resources, elimination of disposal costs and reduction in energy requirements and greenhouse gas emissions.

Ministry specifications permit recycled/reclaimed materials to be used in lieu of natural aggregates. Examples include reclaimed asphalt pavement (RAP), reclaimed concrete material (RCM), air-cooled blast furnace slag (BFS), granulated blast furnace slag, crushed glass and ceramics and roofing shingle tabs (RST).

For example, Ontario Provincial Standard Specification (OPSS) 1151 (hot mix asphalt) allows up to 40% RAP in hot mix binder courses and up to 20% RAP in premium surface courses. Aggregates for road base and sub-base (OPSS.PROV 1010) may include up to 100% RCM, up to 100% BFS, up to 40% RAP, and up to 15% crushed glass and/or ceramics

MTO and connecting link municipalities share an interest in ensuring the durability of asphalt applied on connecting links. This can best be accomplished by applying ministry quality of material specifications used on provincial highways.

Standard Specification requirements for the properties for the various grades of Performance Graded Asphalt Cements (PGAC) are given in MTO OPSS 1101, November 2014. Connecting link municipalities should have regard to Special Provision No. 111F09M, February 23, 2015 which requires additional testing requirements (including Extended Bending Beam Rheometer) and acceptance criteria for all PGAC grades. Suppliers of PGAC must be listed as an asphalt cement supplier in MTO's Designated Sources for Materials Manual (DSM).

The additional up-front costs for more sustainable construction practices will be offset by the extended life of connecting link pavement and structures. The use of higher grade construction materials, more rigorous materials testing, contact administration, etc., are eligible for subsidy.

For more information contact your local Ministry of Transportation regional office listed in Section 10.

Appendix 6 – Connecting Link Inventory Requirements

Applicants are required to submit an Excel file or equivalent data file for ministry import into Excel that includes the following information for road sections and structures (three metres in length or greater in direction of traffic) for all connecting links in the municipality.

This information will be used to determine the current state of connecting link infrastructure and the ten year capital improvement needs across the province.

Two data tables are required: Table 1 below lists the road data items and Table 2 lists the structure data items to be included. Please submit only connecting link road/bridge data – no other municipal roads or structures.

Purpose

To obtain consulting services for a comprehensive review for the City of Cornwall Zoning By-law.

Recommendation

That RFP 19-P11 be awarded to WSP Canada Group Limited, from Ottawa, Ontario, at the total bid price of \$234,249.00 (net cost to the Corporation - \$210,948.48) being the best Proposal meeting the specifications.

Strategic Priority Implications

This report addresses Council's accountability and transparency to the ratepayers of the City of Cornwall.

Financial Implications

Through the 2019 Budget process, it was proposed to fund the Zoning By-law Review over a two-year period, beginning in 2019. The Corporation has budgeted \$100,000 in the 2019 Budget and will budget the remaining \$111,000



in the 2020 Budget. Funding for both years will come from the Working Reserve (Planning Studies).

Background / Discussion

In April of 2018, the Assistant Deputy Minister of Housing signed a letter of approval for the City of Cornwall Official Plan. With the signing of that Official Plan, the Planning Act, Section 26(9) states that a municipality must, no later than three years after a revision comes into effect; amend the Zoning By-laws that are in effect in the municipality to ensure they conform with the Official Plan. In response to this, the Planning Division initiated an RFP process to obtain a consulting firm to assist with this update of more than 500 amendments. This is a result of the fact that the Zoning By-law dates back to 1969 and although there have been major updates to certain parts of the Zoning By-law; there has not been a comprehensive update.

The Corporation invited proposals from qualified consultants to prepare a new Comprehensive Zoning By-law to replace By-law No. 751.1969, as amended.

The new comprehensive Zoning By-law is to meet the following objectives:

- Provide a Comprehensive Zoning By-law in accordance with the recently approved Official Plan;
- Undertake any necessary background research to ensure the Zoning By-law is consistent with current legislation and policy;
- To create an updated Zoning By-law that reflects current development standards and approaches, eliminates provisions which are no longer required or effective, and establishes new provisions which better reflect current and projected circumstances;
- To streamline the document and simplify provisions, where possible;
- Be presented in a user friendly, Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act (AODA) format.

The Comprehensive Zoning By-law Review will be conducted with the benefit of a comprehensive public engagement and consultation program that will promote input and foster consensus with stakeholders, the public, government agencies, and the private sector.







SDG Paramedic Services Community Paramedic Program offers a seasonal influenza program in order to aid in the diversion of hospital use in response to residents showing signs of influenza-like illness.

This initiative makes use of Primary Care Paramedics with Autonomous IV certification to offer treatment for persons with confirmed cases of influenza. The paramedic works under standing Orders of a Medical Director to assess and treat residents of Long-Term Care and Retirement Homes and activating a Community Paramedic for patients with suspected influenza has the potential to reduce the need to emergency resources and assist with the containment of the virus.

Several physicians from long term care facilities, nursing homes or the health unit ask that specific medical procedures be competed under their authority. This may include but not limited to flu shots, fluid replacement, or prescription medicine administration.





A By-law to adopt, ratify and confirm the proceedings of the Council of The Corporation of the City of Cornwall at its meetings held on Tuesday, November 12, 2019.

Whereas Section 5(1) of the Municipal Act, S.O. 2001, c.24 thereto provides that the powers of a municipal Corporation shall be exercised by its Council; and

Whereas Section 5(3) of the Municipal Act, S.O. 2001, c.24 and amendments thereto, provides that the powers of Council are to be exercised by By-law: and

Whereas in many cases action which is taken or authorized to be taken by Council does not lend itself to the passage of an individual By-law; and

Whereas Section 248 provides that if a council passes a comprehensive general by-law that consolidates and includes the provisions of any By-law previously passed by the Council; and it is deemed expedient that a By-law be passed to authorize the execution of agreements and other documents and that the proceedings of the Council of The Corporation of the City of Cornwall at this meeting be confirmed and adopted by By-law.

Now therefore be it resolved that the Council of The Corporation of the City of Cornwall enacts as follows:



1. (a) That the following Minutes of the Public Meetings of the Municipal Council of The Corporation of the City of Cornwall be and the same are hereby adopted:

(i) Regular Public Meeting of Council #2019 – 27 of Monday, October 28, 2019

(b) That the following Minutes of the In Camera Meeting pertaining to the security or part of the property of the Municipality or Local Board, personal matters about an identifiable individual, including municipal or Local Board employees, a proposed or pending acquisition or disposition of land by the Municipality or Local Board, labour relations or employee negotiations, litigation or potential litigation, including matters before administrative tribunals, affecting the Municipality or Local Board, advice that is subject to solicitor-client privilege, including communications necessary for the purpose, a matter in respect of which a Council, Board, Committee other body may hold a closed meeting under another Act, or for the purpose of educating or training the members and where no member discusses or otherwise deals with any matter in a way that materially advances the business or decision-making of the council, local board or committee, be and the same are hereby adopted:

(i) Regular In Camera Committee of Council #2019 – 15 of Monday, October 28, 2019

(c) That the actions of the Council at its meetings held on Tuesday, November 12, 2019, in respect of each recommendation contained in all reports of the regular and in-camera meetings and in respect of each motion, resolution and other action taken by the Council at its said meeting is, except where the prior approval of the Ontario Municipal Board or other authority is by law required, hereby adopted, ratified and confirmed as if all such proceedings were expressly embodied in the By-law;

(d) That the above mentioned actions shall not include any actions required By-law to be taken by resolutions.

2. That where no By-law has been or is passed with respect to the taking of any action authorized in or by the above mentioned Minutes or with respect to the exercise of any powers by the Council in the above mentioned Minutes, then this By-law shall be deemed for all purposes to be the By-law required for approving and authorizing and taking of any action authorized therein or thereby, or required for the exercise of any powers therein by the Council.



3. The Mayor and proper officials of The Corporation of the City of Cornwall are hereby authorized and directed to do all things necessary to give effect to the above-mentioned actions and to obtain approvals where required.

4. Unless otherwise provided, the Mayor and Clerk are hereby authorized and directed to execute and the Clerk to affix the seal of The Corporation of the City of Cornwall to all documents necessary to give effect to the above mentioned actions.

5. It is declared that notwithstanding that any section or sections of this Bylaw or parts thereof, may be found by any court of law to be bad or illegal or beyond the power of the Council to enact, such section(s) or part(s) hereof shall be deemed to be severable and that all other sections or parts of this By-law are separate and independent there from and enacts as such.
