

WHAT IS A CRITICAL/MAJOR INCIDENT?



- Calls for service or proactive operations that have a high potential to turn violent if the risks are not mitigated
- Examples include barricaded persons, hostage situations, high risk arrests, warrant service and protests



INCIDENT COMMANDER

- Must make appropriate decisions on how to manage a critical incident scene
- How to deal with the variety of problems inherent in incidents
- Require strong understanding of tactical advantages





Who is an Incident Commander?

- Staff Sergeant
- Inspector
- Deputy Chief
- Chief

Training

- Incident Command training follows the IC series of courses from IC 100 to IC 500
- Two training scenario's semiannually
- Two table-top scenario's semiannually
- Mentoring by Incident Command Coordinator

Who activates the Incident Command System?

 At the discretion of the Duty Officer, Senior Officer, Chief or Deputy Chief for any incident requiring the additional resources and structure provided by the IC




INCIDENT COMMANDER'S PRIORITIES

- > Determine the nature and urgency of the incident/ if further action is required
- > Assess the incident priorities and stabilize the situation
- Maximize officer / public safety and preserve life
- > Prepare for an event in progress or prepare to prevent its occurrence
- Restore public order
- ➤ Provide assistance to other agencies/partners
- > Upon arrival at the scene, assess the severity of the situation (potential for harm)
- Ensure a smooth transition of command




Hostage/Barricade Communications Link
